An instrument to measure the intensity of X-rays when used on deep-seated human organs at any depth desired has been invented by a Swiss scientist.

A glass for X-ray photography has been invented in Europe which absorbs only from 10 to 15 per cent of the rays, permitting much sharper pictures to be made than heretofore.

Deposits of potash that promise much have been discovered in two of Spain's provinces. An attachment to be filled with oil to quiet rough water features a new lifeboat anchor.

Copenhagen maintains a permanent exhibition of devices to protect workmen from accidents. A chemical process for making salt-proof against dampness has been patented by a Virginian.

Bolivia is to have its first mill for the production of woolen and cotton textiles in the year. By drawing a toothed scraper across prints of butter small cone-shaped portions are formed.

An Englishman is the inventor of a pitcher for wines with an ice compartment to cool its contents. One pocket for umbrellas and another for overshoes are combined in a bag that can be hung on a wall.

The Japanese Government has established a factory for the production of carbolic acid from coal tar. An arrow has been painted on the back of a new glove for automobile drivers to aid them in signalling.

Several varieties of grass that grow prolifically in India have been found to make excellent paper pulp. Spine clips instead of staples is possible to hold a new reflector and shade at any angle on an incandescent lamp.

Seaweed, chemically treated, fire-proofed and made into pads, forms a material for sound-proofing walls. Switzerland will spend nearly \$4,000,000 for the further electrification of its railways the coming year.

An aeroplane that can be used either as a monoplane or biplane has been designed by a French automobile builder. So that restaurant tables can be given clean linen quickly a long table cloth, mounted on rollers, has been invented.

An electrical device has been invented in England that automatically awakens all sleeping firemen, switches on all lights and opens the doors of a fire-station when an alarm is received.

In the first nine months of last year 70,225 tons of manganese ore were mined and shipped by 88 operators in the United States, as compared with 26,996 tons and 55 operators in all of the year 1916.

According to a distinguished English scientist there is some form of radiation from chalk and granite cliffs, possibly electrical, that causes climatic differences in places in the same vicinity.

A San Francisco man has invented a machine for automatically marking citrus fruit with any desired inscription by melting the wax on the other skin by electricity and stamping the second skin with ink.

A famous optical works in Austria is using ultra-violet rays produced by arc lights, the carbons of which are impregnated with the salts of iron, for examining the purity of materials with which it deals.

Guided by hand, but moved and operated by a gasoline engine, a machine invented by a New Jersey man will spade up ground, break the clods with forks, open a furrow, plant seed, cover it and pack the earth again.
