
A corner of the Garden of Gethsemane, near Jerusalem. The garden occupies about a third of an acre, and is surrounded by a wail covered with stucco. It is under the control of the Franciscans, and contains eight olive trees of great age, which may well have sprung from the roots of those which were there in the time of Christ.



The Mount of Olives and the Mosque of the Ascension. The building shown belongs to the Mohammedans, and marks the site of the Ascension. The central part of the building takes the form of a small octagonal chapel containing the footprint of Christ.



The entry into Jarusalem. A beautiful fountain near one of the gates. This fountain is a fair example of the really beautiful monuments which are to be found here and there in Jerusalem. The Bab el Silsileh (Gate of the Chain) is the eastern entrance to the Inner Haram Enclosure, surrounding the Dome of the Rock. Just inside is the beautiful little Dome of the Chain.




A general view of the Pools of Solomon outside Jesrusalem. The pools are three huge oblong cisterns of masonry, and take their name from a passage in Eccles. ii. 6: "I made me pools of water, to water therewith the wood that bringeth forth trees." The place is thus described in Lewin's "Journal of a Visit to Jerusalem": The pools are at the head of the Valley of Urtas, and are distant about eight miles from Jerusalem. At the north-east corner of the lowest pool was an aqueduct which brings the water from the chamber at the north-west of the Upper Pool and conveys it to Bethlehem." Originally it was brought as far as Jerusalem.





The Grotto of the Agony where Judas gave the kiss of betraval. The Grotto of the Agony is a cave in the fock, and it was there, according to tradition, that the disciples slept while Christ prayed on the Mount of Olives near at hand, and where on His return to His sleeping disciples Judas gave Him the kiss of betrayal.



The ancient mulberry tree at Siloam and the pool where sight was given to the blind man. The pool was originally square, and near it are the remains of a fifth century chapel. Close by is the gnarled and withered trunk of an ancient mulberry tree, supported by stones. The Jews declare it marks the spot where the Prophet Isaiah was martyred by King Manassen.
