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MISSIONARY FROM CHINA INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

PREACHED IN QUEEN STREET METHODIST CHURCH SUNDAY.

A Lady Missionary From India Gave an Address in First Baptist Church—Rev. Dr. Hugh Pedley, Montreal, at Queen's University.

Rev. R. E. S. Taylor, Ottawa, on a thorough address in Queen street Methodist church on Sunday morning. He was a decidedly interesting speaker. He appeared in Chinese costume. Miss Vera Allen wearing the attire of a native woman. Mr. Taylor in an entertaining way talked of the life and labors of missionaries and also sang in the Chinese tongue. The auditors were greatly pleased with the address.

In the evening Rev. Mr. Ellis, the pastor, began a series of addresses on the patriarchs of Bible times, which he will deliver on Sunday evenings. He gave a very illuminating review of Abraham, the father of the faithful, discussing the subject under the heads of his separation, his consecration and his sacrifice and made pointed to-day applications.

Sermon at Queen's.

Rev. Dr. Hugh Pedley, Montreal, was foreword and eloquent in his discourse at Queen's University on Sunday afternoon. He took Job as typifying the woes and sorrows of humanity, dwelt on war features and the generally accepted causes, and concluded by pointing to Jesus as the comfort and consolation of the world in its darkest hours.

Missionary in First Baptist.

A very interesting story about missionary work in India, was told in the First Baptist Church on Sunday morning, when Dr. Jessie Allyn, returned missionary from India, was the preacher.

Dr. Allyn has spent six years in India, and is now home on furlough. The outstanding point of her address was the need of a well-equipped hospital. She said that through the work in the hospitals a great deal of missionary work could be accomplished. People who were ill were given the best possible treatment, and afterwards the missionaries had a splendid opportunity to speak to them and consult them about their spiritual life.

The speaker declared that one of the greatest of the many needs in India to-day was that of good hospitals.

Dr. Allyn stated that the young men leaving the universities who had been treated at the hospitals and had been led to live a Christian life were a powerful force in the work as they could best speak to the people and explain matters to them.

At Chalmers Church.

At Chalmers Church on Sunday Rev. H. M. Hamilton, of the First Presbyterian Church, Brockville, was the special speaker of the day and delivered forceful sermons.

Rev. Mr. Hamilton was introduced by Rev. Dr. W. G. Jordan and latter made feeling reference to the speaker, who lost a son at the front.

CANNOT VOTE MONEY FOR SUBURBAN AREA

Civic Finance Committee Wants Work on County Roads Stopped This Year

The finance committee will recommend to the City Council to-night that in view of conditions this year no work be done on the suburban road area, on which the city last year expended \$4,000 as its share. The committee says it cannot see its way clear to put any amount in the budget this year for work on county roads when no paving is likely to be done in the city and when the people are taxed high enough. It is recommended that the County Council, which meets this week, also take action towards having suburban area work discontinued this year.

The finance committee also claims that Kingston last year did not get value for its portion of the cost, it paying \$4,000 for patchwork when the understanding was that suburban area road building was to be of a permanent character.
