BROKE BONE IN LEG FINE HOME LEFT FOR THE SOLDIERS

MAJOR DOUGLAS ELLIS IS IN A LONDON HOSPITAL

He Was Passed Along the Line And He Was Pleased for He Was Able to Enjoy the Experience — His Brother Walter is a Lieutenant. Major Douglas S. Ellis, son of Mrs. W. S. Ellis, 209 Albert St., is around again after having suffered an accident some time ago. He broke a small bone in his right leg about four inches above the ankle. In writing to his mother he told the circumstances of the accident: "I was going to camp from the Army school and was jumping out of a wagon about half a mile from camp when I did the deed. I thought at first it was a sprain and there was almost no pain at all. After two days the doctor



announced a break and sent me down. I was pretty disgusted for I had hoped to give Weatherbe a rest after his five weeks in charge. However I was no use there so I had to go. It was an awfully interesting trip for I was able to see everything going on." The Major related going through a Field Ambulance, a casualty clearing station, a hospital train, No. 20 General hospital, then on to London and to I.O.D.E. Hospital, 1 Hyde Park Place, London, Eng., a real home for Canadian officers. Major Ellis will be in hospital till early in February. The Major is in the O.C. of the 4th Field Co., Engineers, France.

Lieut. Walter H. Ellis is now with the 4th Canadian Siege Battery. He spent fifteen months on the firing line with the Engineers and then transferred to the Artillery. He was advanced, secured a commission, and went to England to qualify. He is now back in the lines in France.

At the meeting of the Soldiers' Aid Commission in Toronto, Hon. W. D. McPherson announced that a house with twenty-five rooms at Perth, Ont., furnished completely in the very best of style, had been left to the Commission to be used for the benefit of soldiers and their dependents, and that he was now in communication with the Military Hospitals Commission for the purpose of arranging that the house and grounds might be used, if required for disabled soldiers who had no relatives or friends to care for them. TRAIN SERVICES BAD.

Shortage of Coal Across Border Delays Almost All Trains.

The trains throughout the Dominion are keenly suffering from the coal situation, and with bad weather few of them are able to keep their schedules. There is a reasonably good supply of coal in Canada, but trains that cross the border are slowed up while passing through the United States.

The Internationals Limited, coming from Chicago, has been from four to eight hours late every day last week. This is said to be due to the delay in reaching Detroit as the American trains are all thrown off their schedules by the scarcity of coal. This in turn delays this Canadian train.

On all of the time tables now being issued, a notice signed by the Canadian Railway War Service Board tells the public that it takes 100 pounds of coal per passenger train mile and that it is co-operation in the country's interests to appreciate and eliminate as far as possible the difficulties of the railways.

BAR ADDED TO CROSS

Major G. Anglin, M.C., Receives Further Honor.

Major Gerald Anglin, M.C., who has been awarded a bar to his Military Cross for bravery shown during the Passchendaele fighting, when he was wounded in the leg, went overseas as a captain, with a battalion from St. John, N.B., and was promoted on the field. He was awarded the Military Cross at the Somme for personally conducting a bombing raid, although wounded. He is twenty-one years old, and prior to enlisting was employed by Anglins Limited, contractors, Montreal. His brother, Lieut. L. G. Anglin, who went overseas with a Montreal battalion, was killed in action at Vimy Ridge, just after he had been granted a commission. Another brother, Capt. Arthur Anglin, is overseas with a Canadian Siege Battery. The brothers are the sons of Dr. J. V. Anglin, of St. John, N.B., and nephews of Lieut.-Col. W. G. Anglin, Kingston.
