

The arrest of Joseph Caillaux, formerly Premier, was due principally to a cable despatch from Secretary Lansing at Washington saying that in 1915 Caillaux had been in communication with the Berlin Foreign Office. Secretary Lansing's despatch stated that the American representative at Buenos Ayres had been able to establish that Caillaux, during his sojourn in Argentina, in 1915, had been in communication with the Berlin Foreign Office through Count von Luxburg, then German Minister to Argentina, with the object to concluding peace with Germany at any price so as to permit the resumption of business.
