PLACED FIRE BOMBS ON OCEAN LINERS At Least Five Vessels Were Destroyed by This Means.

New York, Jan. 24.—Testifying in the trial here of Franz von Rintelen, German naval reservist, and twelve other defendants, charged with conspiracy to place fire bombs on steamships here, Sergeant Henry Barth, of the police squad, declared circumstances pointed to the placing on the Lusitania of bombs which had been in the possession of two of the defendants.

Lt. Lester Dickson of Holbrook Home on Furlough to Recuperate.

Woodstock, Jan. 24.—Lieut. Lester Dickson has arrived home from England on furlough. He went over a couple of months ago, and has been with the Royal Flying Corps in France for some months. He has had many thrilling experiences and narrow escapes. On five different occasions he was shot down, and on each occasion the observer accompanying him was killed.

MAY TAKE OVER PAPER MILLS

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—There is a possibility of the Government taking over a couple of paper mills and furnishing the newspapers with their needed supply.

WAR BULLETINS

- Six large British freighters and two smaller ships were sunk by submarines last week. Major-Gen. Laurence has been appointed new British chief of staff on the western front. President Wilson says the United States will have double the army originally planned in France next June. British labor takes strong ground in favor of continuing the war till a general and just peace is assured. Some reports say the Russian Bolsheviks are likely now to accept a German peace.

TEUTONS RETIRE AT MONTE TOMBA

Brilliant French Victory Forces Enemy to Evacuate Much Territory.

COMPELLED TO GIVE UP
