At Least This is Report Coming From Petrograd---Germany Makes Statement Regarding Russian Territory.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) New York, Jan. 24 .-- According to the News Agency despatches, the Smolny Institute in Petrograd has announced a revolution in Austria, indicating that the revolutionists have named a cabinet and are making progress. There has been no confirmation, but it is known there has been serious social and economic unrest in the dual empire for some time.

A German Demand.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Petrograd, Jan. 24.—Russia must give up Courland and all the Baltic provinces or the Germans will resume their military operations and occupy Reval within a week. So a German delegation at the Brest-Litovsk negotiations informed the Russian representatives at the last session, of the conferees. An adjournment was taken until January 29th to permit the Russians to consider the German terms.

War Tidings.

Several attacks by British aeroplanes were made on the Turkish cruiser Goeben in the Dardanelles.

Two hits were secured. Take Jonescu, one of the leading statesmen of Rumania, declares that the Rumanian people will remain faithful to the Entente Allies until the end, "whatever that end will be."

The French government has decided to apply the bread rationing system to the Paris district on January 29th, extending it gradually throughout the country.
