USE THE LOWER CAMPUS

SUGGESTION MADE THAT IT BE UTILIZED AS A GARDEN.

Many of the Men Undergoing Treatment at Queen's Military Hospital Would Enjoy the Work.

There are six returned soldiers, namely Sergt. Leonard, Pte. Peters, Pte. Convery, Pte. Lett, Bdr. Rowland and Bdr. Dalby, attending the annual course of agriculture instruction held by A. W. Sirett at the rooms on Market street. These men are for the most part farmers who are thus taking advantage of their convalescence time to gain a more intimate and advanced knowledge of the work that they will do on their discharge.

For some time there has been a great amount of discussion of the problem confronting Canada of getting the returned soldier to go back to the farm. This course seems to offer a solution. In discussing the situation with a returned soldier, who was formerly a farmer, he said: "Why not suggest to the public that the lower campus of Queen's University would be an ideal place for a garden to be worked by returned soldiers. This would answer the dual purpose of assisting in the Greater Production movement and also in giving an interesting and instructive amusement for the soldiers who are forced by their wounds to sit around day after day vainly hoping for some amusement to keep their minds occupied."

The suggestion is made that the Vocational Training staff might cooperate with A. W. Sirett in this movement, and with competent instructors to keep the men's efforts properly directed, it might prove to be a movement with far-reaching results.

JUNIORS SHOULD GO FAR

WITH WELL-BALANCED LINE-UP TO CLASH WITH BELLEVILLE.

Batteries Have Intermediate Honors Clinched So Far, Though There Is One Game to Play.

The hockey season is now well under way with a number of the local games decided. The Kingston Juniors in their game on Wednesday evening against Queen's intermediates proved to be of very fast calibre and with a continued earnestness in practise great things are expected. The defence with Hall and McKelvey proved heart-breaking to Queen's and should do the same to Belleville. This is a well balanced team and will probably give Belleville a decided licking. In the intermediate series, though the Batteries are scheduled to play a third game against Queen's intermediates, there is no doubt as to the outcome. Queen's scored out a victory a week ago by scoring two goals in the last minute of play. The batteries retaliated, however, on Monday by winning by 22 to 2. This indicates very clearly that the soldiers can defeat the students on Friday evening. There is now a rumour that Queen's will default this game on Friday night. This "dope" shows batteries to be the best team by long odds. The soldiers will on that "dope" play the Ottawa or Belleville intermediate teams.

ALLOWANCES INCREASED.

Important Changes Are Announced by Patriotic Fund. A number of important changes to the schedule of allowances allotted to dependents of soldiers have been made by the executive committee of the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

By the new regulations the maximum allowance for dependents in Eastern Canada has been raised to \$40 per month, instead of \$35 as formerly. This increase, which amounts to \$10 within the last two months, is due to the increased cost of living, and will materially assist those wives of soldiers who have large families.

Another regulation provides that the different branches shall not deduct \$5 per month from the wives of non-commissioned officers, with the rank of sergeant or sergeant-major, as has been done in the past. This is due to a uniform scale of separation allowances having been adopted for privates and non-commissioned officers.

It is also provided that there shall be no reduction in the allowance granted to returned soldiers who are "out patients" but convalescent homes, on account of the substance allowance having been raised from 60 to 80 cents a day.
