THE SHIPPING SITUATION INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

TRANSPORTATION OF IRON, FELDSPAR, ETC., HELD UP.

Railroads Have Many Difficulties, and These With Government Regulations Heave on Shippers Now. The transportation situation locally is growing worse, and already the shippers are feeling the effects. To prevent congestion at the border the railroads are taking every precaution to make sure that shipments will continue on the American lines. Some time ago the railroads decided that as few as possible Canadian cars would be allowed to cross the border owing to the difficulty of having them returned. Now practically all shipments to the United States have to wait until cars of U.S. railroads are available.

Owing to the congestion at the border of feldspar, shipments of this has been completely tied up for several days. Such shipments as leather, hay, wool, mica, cattle, etc., have to bear a permit from the United States War Board to guarantee their admittance at the border, and others have to bear Canadian permits. All these things are combining to make the situation a very difficult one for shippers, but there are hopes that the obstacles will be cleared away in the near future.

OBITUARY

The Late A. Stroug.

Anthony Stroug, a machinist, who earned his trade while working with the old firm of McEwen & Co., on Queen street, died on Wednesday in Toronto. Deceased was born about sixty-three years ago, leaving Kingston over ten years ago to go to Toronto. The Late Mrs. J. F. Everson.

In the General Hospital on Thursday morning death came to Ellen Louise Swift, wife of Rev. J. F. Everson, Methodist minister, Yarker. Deceased was born in England about thirty-nine years ago, but had lived for years in this country. The remains were transferred to Yarker by the firm of R. J. Reid for burial there. Her husband and two small daughters survive.

The Late C. A. Van Arman.

Charles A. Van Arman, aged about sixty-five, died in the Hotel Dieu on Thursday after a long illness of rheumatism. The funeral is being held from his late residence, 108 Clergy street, to Caturahqui Cemetery. Years ago he kept a confectionery store on King street, between Brock and Princess streets. His daughter, Miss Isabel, and two sons in Rochester, N.Y., and Detroit, Mich., survive.

The Late George A. Wilson.

George A. Wilson, aged sixty-one years, for many years one of Oswego's most prominent and popular business men, passed away on Sunday afternoon at his home following an illness of several years. Deceased was born in Oswego, but for a number of years was a prominent miner in the far west. In 1897, however, he returned to his native town, and conducted a lively business until five years ago, when ill-health compelled him to retire. Besides his mother, Mrs. William Wilson, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. William A. Richardson and Mrs. James T. Bell, of Oswego. The funeral service was conducted at his late residence on Tuesday afternoon.
