

Rumanian Crown Jewels Seized.

Amsterdam, Jan. 25.—According to a Petrograd despatch to German newspapers, received by an indirect route, the Bolsheviks have seized a portion of the funds of the Rumanian treasury, deposited in a Moscow bank, and also taken the Rumanian crown jewels at Kishinev.

According to the despatch, Queen Marie of Rumania has fled from Kishinev to Jassy, the Rumanian capital.

Capture of Harbin.

A Pacific Port, Jan. 25.—Passengers aboard a trans-Pacific liner which arrived here to-day from the Orient, brought details of the capture by Chinese of Harbin, the Manchurian city of Harbin.

T. J. Davis, of Chicago, one of the passengers, said the Chinese took the city in an unique but effective manner.

"The Chinese commander," Mr. Davis said, "walked into the office of the Bolshevik commander and promptly killed him."

Much fighting followed," Mr. Davis said. At the close of hostilities, he asserted, the well-armed Chinese troops had driven the Bolshevik soldiers from the city.

Bishop James McGolrick, of the Catholic diocese of Duluth, died suddenly on Wednesday night.

RETURNED MEN'S RECORDS MOST HUMAN ILLS TRACED TO ONE CAUSE

ISSUED BY THE SPECIAL SERVICE HEADQUARTERS.

The Public Are Given Some Interesting Information With Regard to Men Who Receive Their Discharge.

623881, Pte. E. J. Whitten, enlisted in the 23rd Battalion in May, 1915, at Ottawa. He went overseas in July, 1916, with the 154th Battalion, to which he had transferred. In England the unit was stationed at East Sandling. Here Pte. Whitten again transferred to the 21st Battalion and accompanied them to France. He was in action on the Somme, and at Vimy Ridge, being wounded on May 2nd at Fresnoy. He was treated at the 3rd Field Ambulance Hospital, and returned to England, after six months at the front. A good record of service for a boy of sixteen years of age. He returned to Canada on November 30th last. His home is in Ottawa.

1258274, Pte. R. L. Sabourin, enlisted in the Divisional Ammunition Column at Ottawa on August 22nd, 1916. He left for England on October 12th and went to Shorncliffe Camp. Here he transferred to the 9th Battery, before going to France. He fought in the battles of Vimy Ridge and before Lens. He returned to Canada on December 4th last. His home is in Ottawa.

1042270, Pte. O. W. Phillips, enlisted on October 26th, 1916, in the 240th Battalion, and went overseas in August of the following year. In England his unit were stationed at Witley Camp, where he transferred to the 156th Battalion. He was eight months overseas, returning on December 19th last. His home is in Ottawa.

480, Pte. G. W. Bannister, joined the 6th Field Company Engineers at Ottawa on April 14th, 1915, and two days later sailed for England with the 2nd Divisional Engineers. After a month at St. Martin's Plain, his unit went to Otterpool Camp, until it left for France on September 16th. From La Harve they went to the Kommal Front, and from there to Dickiebusch, then to the Ypres salient. Afterwards moving down to the Somme front at Aixnolette, Pte. Bannister was in the Vimy Ridge "scrap," and got wounded near Fresnoy on May 3rd, 1917. He was a patient at the 3rd Canadian Hospital at Boulogne, where he remained until 24th, when he was sent to Stepping Hill Hospital, near Stackport, and later at Manchester and Epsom Convalescent Hospitals. He returned to Canada on December 29th last, after twenty-one months in France. His home is in Ottawa.

DEATH OVERTOOK GERMAN PLOTTER

Why Two of Band Are Missing From Gang Now on Trial.

New York, Jan. 25.—Insanity and death overtook two missing members of the band of Germans who plotted to destroy food and munitions ships leaving American ports, it was disclosed in testimony at the trial of Franz von Rintelen, German naval reservist, and twelve others charged with conspiracy.

Police Lieut. Barntz testified that Herbert Ebeling, alleged to have been the man who took the fire-bombs aboard steamships in "cigar-boxes," is in Bloomingdale Asylum, and Max Klein, who eluded the best efforts of the police to capture him, had died in a hospital a few weeks ago.

Inspector Tunney, chief of the Bomb squad, asserted one of the plotters told him that Ebeling had placed bombs on the Lusitania. He also declared that Charles von Kleist, the confidential go-between in the relations between von Rintelen and his subordinates, told him he had seen a cheque for \$10,000 in possession of Dr. Wianz Schoen, a Hoboken chemist, another defendant, made payable to "Hanson," who is alleged to have been von Rintelen.

CANADA AS INDEMNITY.

Just About Right Amount if Germany Wins, Says Taft.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 25.—Former President Taft spoke before the committee on federal relations of the Legislature urging the adoption of a resolution supporting the proposed league of nations to enforce peace.

In picturing the effects of the war should Germany be allowed to win, Mr. Taft said England would not be able to pay an indemnity and added: "It is likely that Germany would think that Canada would be about the right amount of indemnity to exact."

"I think," he continued, "that the farmers of North Dakota will have new ideas when they see German spiked helmets there, if they follow the doctrines of Senator La Follette and those who believe with him."

MEMORIAL WAR SHRINE.

Bobcaygeon Has One Like Those Found in the Old Country.

Penelon Falls, Jan. 25.—A memorial war shrine has been erected at Bobcaygeon similar to those erected in different parts of the old country. This is believed to be the first one erected in Canada, and has accordingly attracted a great deal of attention. The purpose for which it was erected is to keep in honor constantly before the minds of citizens the names of the men who have gone to fight in defence of the Empire.

Labor Wants Light Beer.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—During the Labor Conference last week, it now becomes known, the Labor delegates recommended to the government that it should modify its prohibition regulations so as to permit the legal importation of light beer.

Flight Sub-Lieut. Hubert Salter, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Salter, went to England in March, 1917, enlisted in the Imperial R.N.S.A., was lost Nov. 4th and now reported a prisoner in Germany at Karlsruhe.
