COUNTY COURT CASE
Heard by Judge Lavell—Soldier's Wife Plaintiff.
In a special sittings of the County Court on Wednesday morning, Judge Lavell heard the Kinard vs. Corky suit for \$150. Mrs. Kinard is the wife of a soldier who has been in the king's service for twenty-six years, serving at Malta, Gibraltar and other places. The defendant is Capt. John Corky, of this city. The suit involves the disposal of a quantity of household furniture which was left in Corky's house. As a third party, the Macdonalds, now in England, could not testify, the case required much study, and Judge Lavell reserved his decision.
J. L. Whiting and J. B. Walkem represented the plaintiff and Francis King acted for the defendant.

Military News

Brig-Gen. T. D. R. Hemming inspected the artillery draft on Tuesday afternoon and at the close spoke a few words of commendation of their appearance and perfection in training. When wishing them God-speed he introduced Capt. the Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, who then presented each man with a pocket testament. The draft looked splendid and should prove to be one of the finest bodies of men that has left Canada for the war zone. There are some Military Service Act men in the draft.

Lieut-Col. E. C. Dean, who returned from overseas a short time ago, has reported for duty to Brig-Gen. T. D. R. Hemming. The retiring Assistant Director of Supplies and Transport, Major F. B. Eaton, is now with Col. Dean on an inspection trip to all of the supply depots of the district. Col. Dean will then take over the duties and Major Eaton will proceed to Ottawa.

Major R. E. Porter is looking after the work of rounding up men who are absentees under the Military Service Act. He has a big task, but with the determination of the military authorities to have it done thoroughly there should be few left out of the drag-net that is being drawn over the country. A descriptive roll of all men falling to report for duty under the act is in future to be furnished every day to headquarters. This information will then in turn be given to the assistant provost marshals for action.

With reference to the wearing of ribbons of awarded decorations, district orders say: "An officer, N.C.O. or man will be entitled to wear the ribbon of a decoration which has been awarded to him from the date that his name appears in the Gazette, as from that moment he is entitled to consider himself the recipient of the honor."
