To protect telephones from harm in certain industries a moisture and gas proof cabinet has been invented.
A leather covered metal tube to be slipped over an umbrella to roll it tight has been patented in England.
A new serving fork has a slide which can be pushed down along the times without the fingers touching the food.
An electrical method for the economical recovery of tin from scrap metal has been invented by a French engineer.
A refuse can and fly trap have been combined by an inventor in a device intended to be placed about city streets.
The longest tunnel in the world, fifteen miles in length is planned by a Russian railroad to have an 815 mile detour.
A late falling 940 feet is expected to produce 200,000 horsepower in a projected hydro-electric plant in California.
The Queensland government is planning to import several species of insects that are destructive to the prickly pear.
A holder has been patented for safety razor blades to enable them to be used by tailors or dressmakers for ripping seams.
With government encouragement extensive experiments will be made with a view to reviving the growing of flax in Scotland.
The vacuum cleaning process has been applied with specially designed apparatus to removing soot and dirt from boiler tubes.
