**FINANCES IN GOOD SHAPE**

**BEST STATEMENT EVER PRESENTED TO ONTARIO SYNOD.**

Encouraging Reports Were Received at Meeting of the Executive Held on Tuesday—Grants for Diocesan Missions.

The executive committee of the Diocese of Ontario met on Tuesday morning at 10.30 o'clock in St. George's Hall, Bishop Bidwell presiding.

Those were present: Dean Starr, Archdeacon Beamish, Archdeacon Dobbs, Canon Armstrong, Woodcock, Fitzgerald, Bedford-Jones, Rural Deans Dr. Blagrove, Harris, Crisp, Swaine, Code; Revs. J. H. Coleman, J. de Penesse, Wright, the honorary clerical secretary, Rev. Mr. McTear, also the chancellor, Judge McDonald; R. J. Carson, treasurer; Francis King, lay secretary; Judge Reynolds, and Messrs. R. G. Wright, W. D. Carrol, T. B. Wallace, J. H. Dawson, and the secretary, Rev. J. W. Jones. Also present were Canon Smith, Rev. Thomas Leitch and Rev. A. Cook.

Trenton received permission to sell a lot, subject to the usual conditions.

The report of the auditors showed that the financial statement for the past year has been examined and found correct.

R. J. Carson, treasurer, presented his report, which was admitted by all to be the very best financial statement ever presented of the diocesan finances.

The consolidated fund of \$427,000 showed a gross income of almost seven per cent, and after general expenses had been deducted, six per cent dividend was declared, leaving a surplus of \$2,250 for the present year.

The Episcopal fund also revealed that the bishop's salary had been paid in full, with an addition of \$900 arrears.

The treasurer stated it was the highest dividend ever declared, which enabled Synod funds to meet the burden of their great obligations without the usual deficit.

A letter was read from Rev. T. W. Savary, accepting on behalf of the Frontenac Diocese their portion of the extra amount asked for the north-west missions for 1918.

The Diocese of Ottawa invited the Diocese of Ontario to unite with them in the reciprocity of benefice funds. A committee was appointed to deal with the matter.

The chancellor's report on investments declared the financial statement one of the most satisfactory in many years.

Following the report of the chancellor, the members took occasion to pay tribute to the services rendered by the new clerical secretary, Rev. J. W. Jones. He has carried on splendid service during the short time he has been in office, and the members wished to bear testimony to this. The praise was certainly well deserved, for Mr. Jones has a firm grasp on all the duties of this most important position.

The report of the secretary took up the matter of an overdraft of \$2,062 of rectory lands funds, and after an excited and somewhat academic discussion it was resolved to pay it out of the rest fund, which at present consists of \$5,860.

It was further resolved to strike off as a loss a lot of the Belleville rectory.

Instead of half-yearly dividends to the rectors, it was resolved to declare and pay a quarterly interim dividend, and instead of the missionaries receiving cheques quarterly, as heretofore, monthly payments are to be made.

In the general appeal for assistance to aid the chaplains overseas in providing recreation for the men, the Diocese of Ontario has done more than the share allotted, chiefly owing to the efforts of its bishop and clergy. The sum of \$860 was raised and forwarded in a few weeks.

A committee was appointed to report concerning the fund of \$500 standing in the name of St. John's church, Belleville.

The clergy trust fund was then dealt with. The annuitants have died, leaving fourteen annuitants on the fund. The report of the auditors showed that the fund could almost sustain seventeen annuitants. It was resolved to add Rev. Canon Bedford-Jones, Rev. A. L. McTear and Rev. Thomas Leitch to the list. There still being a surplus left, according to canon, it was given to Rev. J. H. Coleman, of Napanee.

The divinity students' fund capital was increased by \$800. An appeal will be made during Lent to aid two divinity students.

Archdeacon Dobbs presented his report on general missions. This sum totaled \$17,000, including Bishop Mill's legacy of \$1,000, and was disposed of as follows:

North-west and foreign field, \$7,250; Diocesan missions, \$7,236; widows' and orphans' fund, \$2,286; clergy superannuation fund, \$74.

Besides the usual apportionment of the M.S.C.C. of \$7,000, an extra \$1,330 for special appeals was included in the apportionment for 1918.

Home missions were then dealt with, and the grants to diocesan missions for 1918 are as follows:

\$200—Rawden, Amherst Island, \$250—Marmora.

\$200—Kitley, Bannockburn, Tweed, Shannonville, Augusta.

\$250—Madoc, Pittsburgh, Malorytown.

\$400—Loborough, Westport, Marysburgh.

\$500—Sharbot Lake, Parham, Selby, Bannockburn, Clarendon, Coe Hill, North Addington, Manoth.

Special grants, at the direction of the bishop, were made to Parham, Selby, Bancroft, Edwardsburgh, Odessa, North Addington, Wellington, Wolfe Island.

The total sum voted for home missions was \$9,150.

The meeting was regarded by all as the most successful ever held, and much praise was bestowed upon Bishop Bidwell for the able manner in which he presided and carried on the busy session which was so fruitful of important matters and which was despatched in good time.

After the meeting Canon and Mrs. Fitzgerald entertained the members of the executive at luncheon at the Randolph Hotel, and the gathering was a most pleasant one.
