SCANDAL ACTION ENTERED

TWO MEN, THEIR WIVES AND THIRD MAN'S WIFE INVOLVED.

The suit is for \$500 for Defamation of Character—Judge Will Have Task Sifting the Facts.

Kingston has been the scene in the last few years of some of the most sensational legal cases of the province. In a few weeks there is to be a scandal case of the first water which will involve two married men and their wives and a third man's wife. The suit is for \$500 for defamation of character.

It seems that two married men took advantage of the absence of a third man to be entertained by the latter's wife. The proof of this will be part of the evidence of the case. Some time later one of the married men, to revenge himself on the other for some complaint, imaginary or otherwise, "spilled the beans" by telling the other man's wife all about their "outing." This naturally raised trouble. With the denial of the charge to the wife came the entering of this suit for \$500. The defendant claims that the story told the other man's wife is true and will offer this as his defence.

ST. GEORGE'S; ST. JAMES' CONGREGATIONS TO UNITE FOR BALANCE OF WINTER.

Service to be Held in Each on Alternate Sundays—No Week-day Services to be Held.

The rectors and wardens of the Anglican churches of the city met in St. James' rectory Thursday evening, at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese, to consult with him as to what action the Anglican churches should take in view of the present coal shortage. It developed that even before there was any authoritative announcement of the shortage, and in spite of the statement at the first of this year that the dealers contended there was sufficient coal on hand or expected to carry the city through the winter, each of the churches had been not only exercising the greatest care in the use of coal, but had also reduced the number of meetings held through the week. St. George's and St. Luke's had both closed their school buildings, and held Sunday school in the church. St. Paul's had cancelled all week-day meetings. St. James' had more recently taken the same action. What further steps could be taken were then discussed.

It was agreed that no week-day services should be held until the situation was relieved. This sacrifice is considerable, when it is remembered that through Lent it is customary to hold many special services. St. Luke's and St. Paul's felt that no reduction could be made in the Sunday services, the former because the church is so far away as to make union services practically impossible, the latter on the ground that as only slack is consumed, the saving would be immaterial. It was also stated that the church building would suffer if not heated at least weekly. St. George's and St. James' then agreed to close on alternate Sundays until further notice, thus saving about three quarters of a ton of coal a week for general consumption, although it is to be noted, that St. George's is also using "slack." Next Sunday the services will be in St. George's and St. James' will be closed.

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OBITUARY

The Late R. Hendry.

Robert Hendry, one of the best known residents of the city, passed away at 3.15 a.m., Friday, in the General Hospital, after a four weeks' illness. Deceased was born in Glasgow on February 26th, 1838, and came to Canada in 1842 in the same ship that carried the late Sir Alex. McKenzie. He settled in Kingston and lived here the greater part of his life. His wife predeceased him eight years ago. It is rather a peculiar fact that he very often made the statement that he would not live a year longer than the late Canon Grout and who died just six days less than a year ago. Deceased was a member of the First Congregational Church and was also very prominent in Masonic work, being one of the oldest Masons in the city. One son in California survives.

The Late Pte. J. W. Bilow.

A military funeral was held on Friday morning to the C.P.R. train to carry the remains of the late Private John William Bilow to his late home at Winchester. The dead soldier enlisted for overseas with the 154th Battalion, but contracting sickness he was taken to the Mowat Memorial Hospital for treatment and remained there until his death. A large number of returned soldiers were in the funeral cortege, men from the Mowat Hospital being the pall-bearers. The Great War Veterans' Association sent a large wreath and a large number of the members attended.

Sad Death of Child.

A sad death occurred on Thursday afternoon, when Margaret Edith, aged twenty-one months, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James McGuire, 2 Quebec street, passed away. Deceased was an exceptionally bright child and beloved by all. She was taken ill on Saturday last with bronchial pneumonia. Besides her sorrowing father and mother she leaves to mourn five sisters and three brothers.

The Late H. McDonald.

Hugh McDonald, aged forty-two years, died early Friday morning in the General Hospital. The remains were sent by the James Reid firm to his late residence at McDonald's Corners for burial.
