up by this and other associations and  
carried through successfully without

**POLICE MADE A SEIZURE**  
OF ABOUT SEVENTY-FIVE COPIES  
OF "FINISHED MYSTERY."

Which Had Been Banned by the  
Government Censor's Orders —  
Found at Home of a Citizen on  
Queen Street.  
The Kingston police on Tuesday  
forenoon confiscated upwards of sev-  
enty-five copies of "The Finished  
Mystery," one of the publications re-  
cently banned on the Government  
censor's orders.  
The books, so it is understood,  
have been handled by the Interna-  
tional Bible Students' Association,  
and, as far as could be learned, the  
copies seized in Kingston were found  
at home of one of the members of  
this association, who resides on  
Queen street. It is understood that  
they have been sold at sixty cents a  
copy.  
The seizure was made by Constables  
Samuel Arnel and Thomas Mull-  
inger.  
As to whether or not there will be  
any prosecution in the case could  
not be ascertained.  
The book is one written by Pastor  
Russell, and it is stated that al-  
though about nine carloads have been  
sent broadcast. At Toronto, Winni-  
peg and other places the police took  
similar action.  
It is understood that orders have  
been given for all the books con-  
fiscated to be destroyed.
