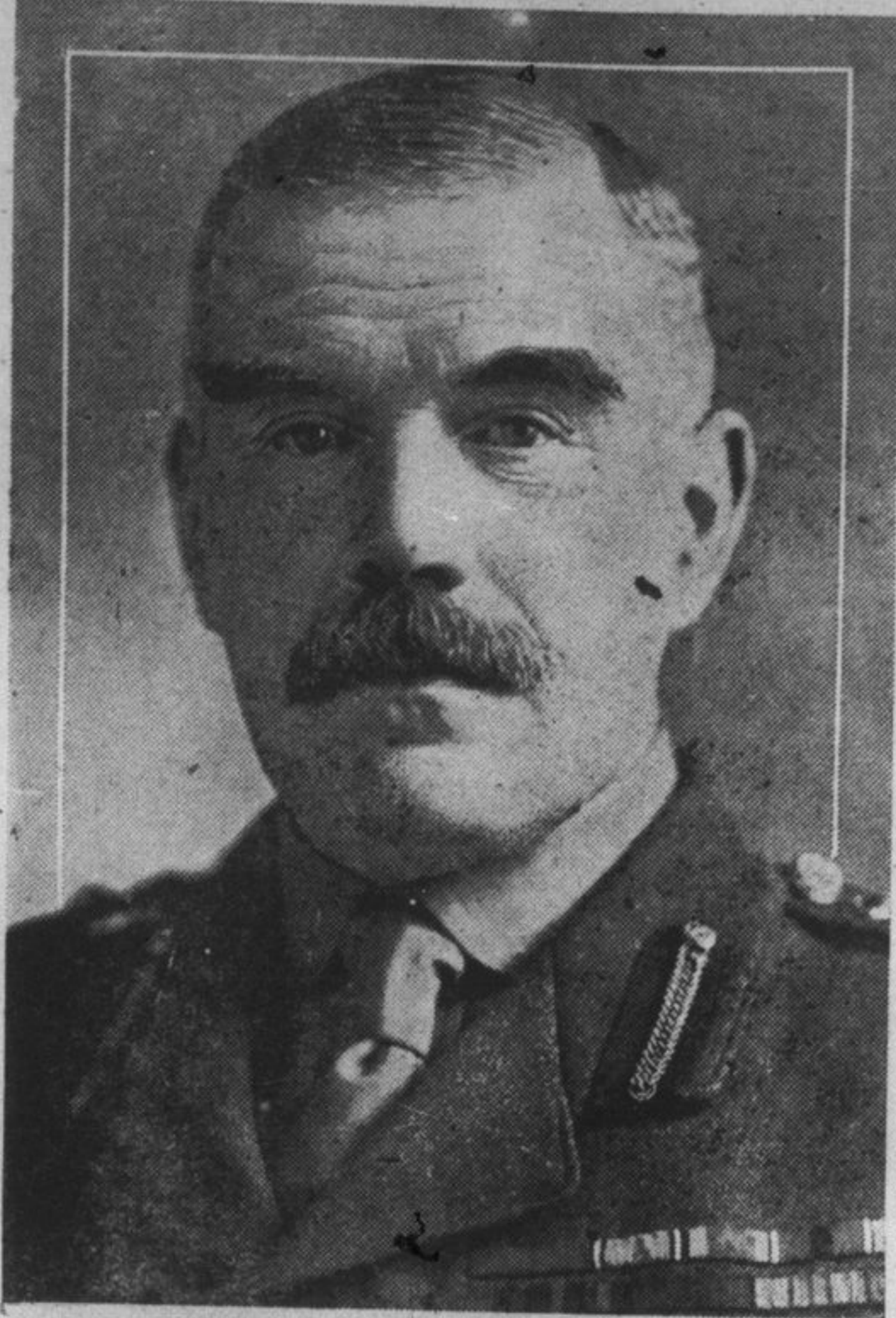

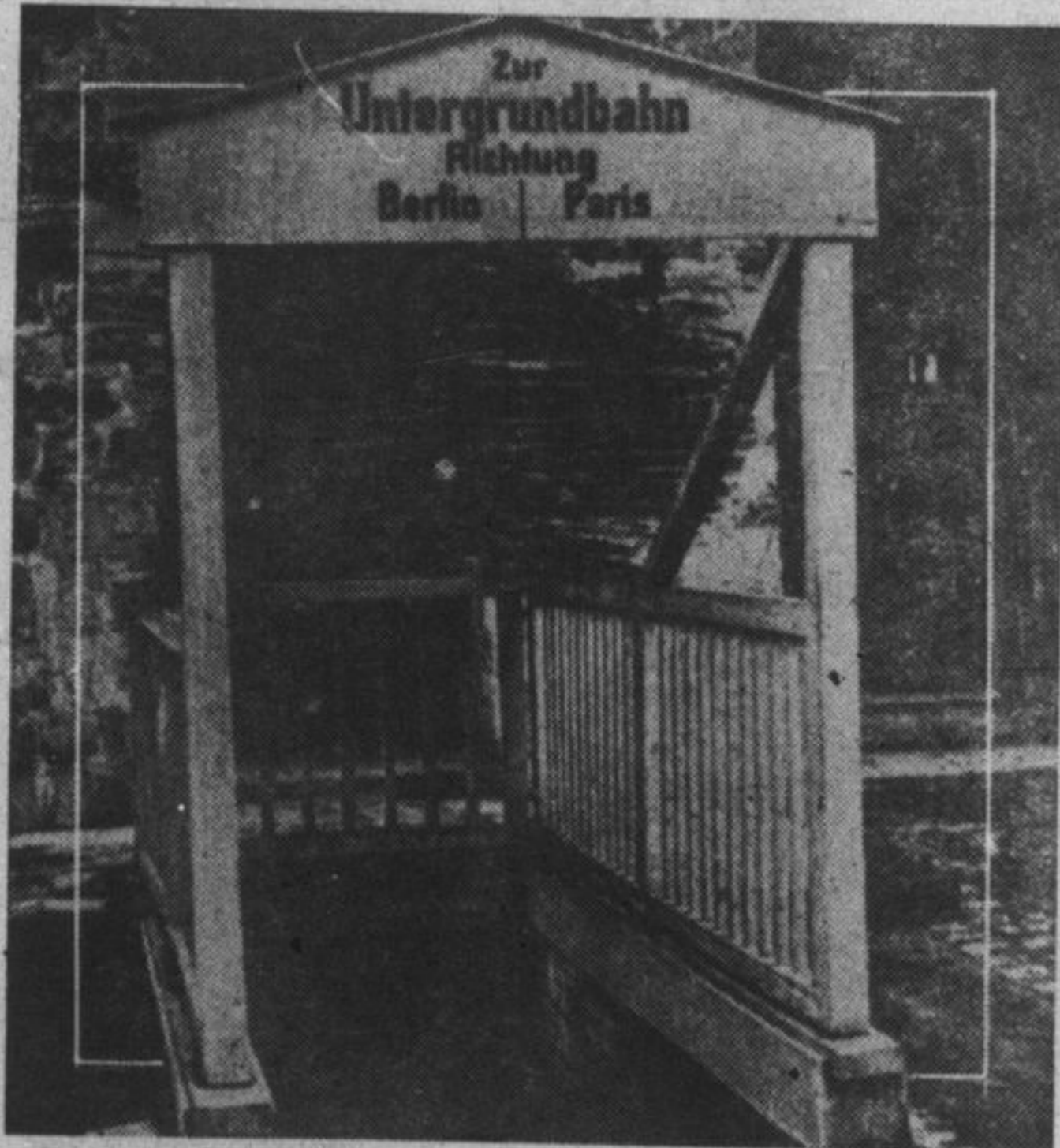
GENERAL SIR WILLIAM ROBERTSON,
Who relinquishes the position of Chief of the British Imperial Staff.



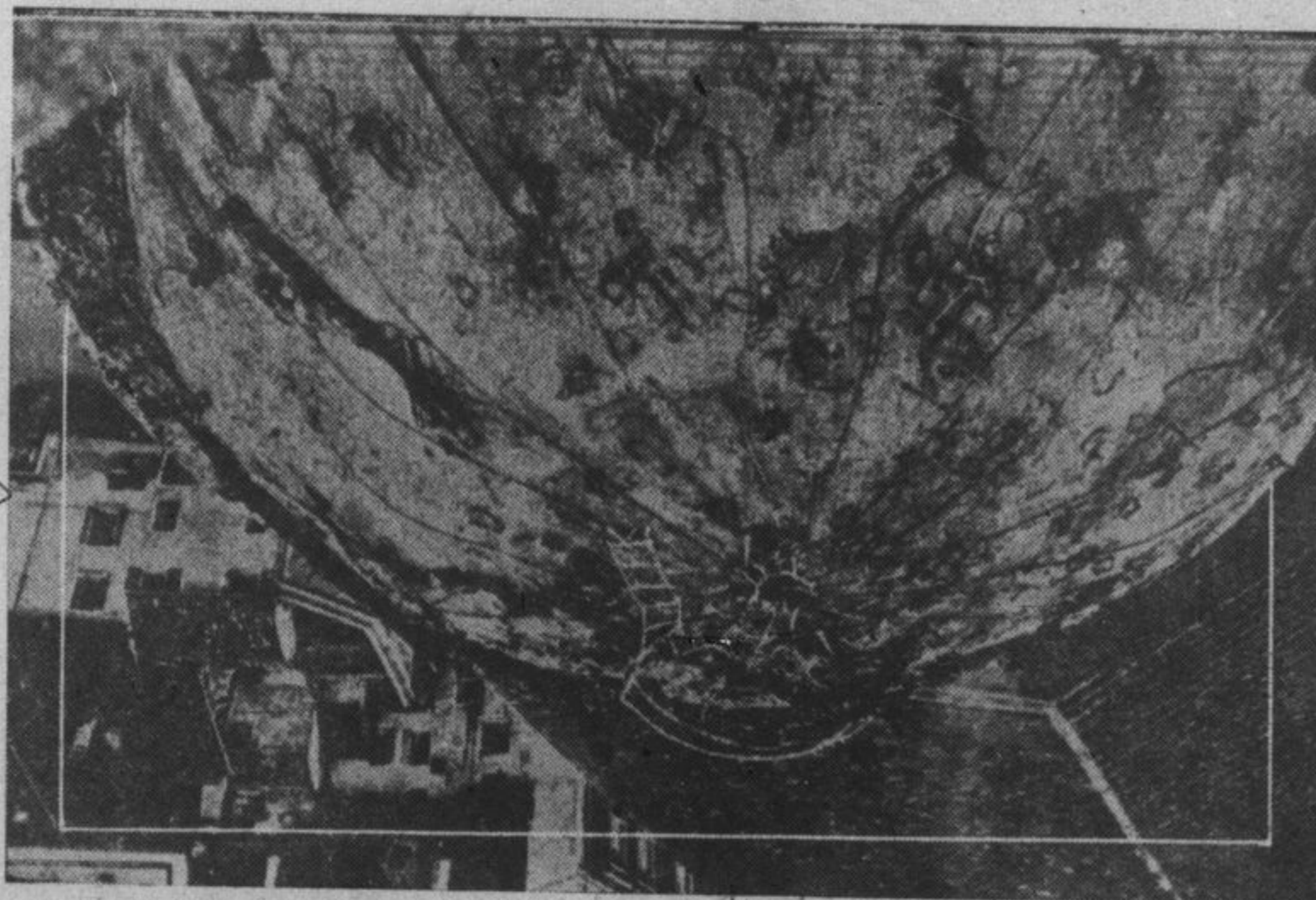
END OF A TEN-MILE AIR FIGHT.
