

This is 23% more ashes in the Killey test, which clearly indicates that 23 % more coal was used than report. On the strength of this report he advises a new fireman for the day shift, because the present one is wasting \$408 in coal by poor fir-ing. On going back to the February

test I find that the day fireman is in no way inferior to the other man, but slightly better. To go back to the pumps.
