

The service on Sunday morning was conducted by the local pastor. Rev. J. G. Nussey. He took as his text, Acts i., 14: "These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication." The speaker showed that they had tarried with one accord in prayer waiting for the promise of the Father to be fulfilled.
