Y.W.C.A. MORTGAGE BURNED

AT A BIG MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY EVENING.

Gifts of \$5,000 From Mr. and Mrs. F. Welch and \$1,000 From Dr. James Douglas, New York.
The spacious parlors of the Y. W. C. A. building on Johnson street were filled to overflowing Tuesday evening by the members of the association. It was a joyous occasion, held to celebrate the burning of the mortgage for \$5,800 which has rested on the building for many years. This happy event was made possible by the very generous gift of \$5,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Fred Welch, of \$1,000 from Dr. James Douglas, of New York, Chancellor of Queen's University, and by the subscriptions of lesser sums from many of the citizens, such of the latter being obtained through the indefatigable efforts of Mr. Welch.

To all of these the president, Miss E. MacCallum, in a few well-chosen words, extended the hearty thanks of the association. The generosity of the friends had made it possible not only to pay off the mortgage, but also to have the nucleus of a fund for necessary repairs and supplies which from time to time will be needed.

Letters of congratulation were read from two former secretaries of the association—Miss J. Bell and Miss L. Knowles—from Mrs. D. Ross, a charter member and generous supporter, and also from Mrs. Adam Shortt, of Ottawa, who while a resident of Kingston gave much and valuable aid to the Y.W.C.A.

A helpful and inspiring address was then given by the Bishop of Ontario. He spoke in a truly broad and catholic spirit, emphasizing the Christianizing and uplifting aims of the association. The need of such an association in our city and the prayerful and sympathetic help it should receive from all classes of citizens were clearly and forcibly expressed by the bishop.

Mr. Welch was then called on. He spoke in a very modest and unassuming way of what he had done for the association, while he praised the work and the spirit displayed by its members.

This was followed by the event of the evening—the burning of the mortgage—Mr. Welch applying the lighted match. As the flames quickly consumed it many in the audience thought of the valued workers who, in days gone by, had borne the burden of the work, and who had given liberally of time, energy and money for its furtherance.

Then came three presentations to the association. The first, from the Girls' Fellowship Club, was a handsome clock, presented on behalf of the club by Miss King, and accepted on behalf of the board by A. Strachan. The Recreation Club gave a commodious revolving office chair, presented by Miss F. Wilson, and accepted by Miss H. Chown. Then on behalf of the members of the board, Mrs. L. Macdonnell presented a Victrola to the girls' club. This was received by Miss Jamieson. James M. Farrell, a tried and valued friend of the association, gave a short address.

On behalf of the Y.M.C.A., the secretary, F. Wilson, read a resolution of congratulation. Interspersed were a piano solo by Miss A. Goodwin, a violin solo by Master P. Richardson, a recitation by Miss Parkes, and a vocal solo by the much-loved and very capable secretary, Miss Foster, all of which were of a high order of merit and were much appreciated by the audience.

The hearty singing of the National Anthem brought this very satisfactory meeting to a close.
HAVE NEW METHOD OF GETTING EVADERS
But the Dominion Police Aren't Telling Any of the Details.

A change of tactics in the apprehension of deserters under the Military Service Act is shortly to be made. The new methods, it is understood are calculated to produce even better results than have so far been attained.

Under the supervision of Inspector James Graham, the Dominion Police engaged in the work have since Saturday noon picked up nearly 20 suspected deserters and draft evaders around Ottawa. Among these were the five members of the Renfrew hockey team, arrested while en route to Ottawa.

The method employed by the police at present in the apprehension of draft-evaders, which centres about railway stations, and places greatly frequented by young men, such as pool-rooms and dance halls, is fairly effective. Suspects are taken up, and, if they have not in their possession papers proving them not liable for military service, whatever explanations they have to make are made at the Provost Marshal's office.

Of the 20 arrests made over the week-end, in this way some twenty are being investigated, and most of the prisoners who are found liable for service will be sent from Ottawa to Kingston to be put into khaki and drafted into the Depot Battalion.

GOT THREE YEARS IN "PEN"

JAMES SMITH PLEADED GUILTY TO SERIOUS CHARGES.
Magistrate Farrell Gave Him Three-year Term for Forging His Name to Military Cheques—Also Guilty of Stealing Blank Cheques.
James Smith, a stranger to the local police, very coolly pleaded guilty to four serious charges in the police court on Wednesday morning. He admitted forging his name to two military cheques, the amount said to reach about \$300. He also pleaded guilty to stealing blank military cheques, and to carrying a loaded revolver without permission.
Smith was rounded up by Capt. A. D. Ogilvie, provost marshal for this district, and the latter had a number of witnesses on hand to back up his charges had the accused pleaded "not guilty" to the charges.
"Guilty your honor," said Smith to each of the charges as they were read by the magistrate. He had no explanation to make for his conduct and without any of the circumstances in the case being related to the court Smith was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary on the one charge of forgery, and seven suspended sentence on the other charges.
Smith stole the blank cheques from one of the local military offices, and then made out the cheques which he managed to have cashed by local parties. He was placed under arrest on Tuesday afternoon.
Cape Vincent booze caused the downfall of one, Charles James. The latter took a ride over to the Cape with a local "cabbie" on Tuesday and came back "loaded." He had nothing "on his hip" when he arrived here, but the amount he had taken while in Uncle Sam's territory was sufficient to put him under. A fine of \$10 and costs was the penalty imposed.
