RECRUITS FOR MINISTRY
REV. DR. W. G. JORDAN MAKES APPEAL TO PRESBYTERY.
 Asks That Members Do All They Can To Get Young Men to Enter Work—Prof. Thomas Stewart, Halifax, Nominated as Moderator for General Assembly.
 An address by Rev. Dr. W. G. Jordan, in which he appealed to the members to do all they possibly could to induce young men to enter the ministry, featured the Tuesday afternoon session of the Kingston Presbytery. Dr. Jordan made a strong appeal in which he declared that if every effort was not put forth to secure the recruits, the church would be crippled and the highest life of the country weakened. He pointed out that much had been said about the country's expansion, with its material resources and splendid future. It was claimed that the 20th Century was for Canada. And in view of all this there was great need for more men to take up the work of the ministry. It was for the ministers themselves to devise ways and means to secure the recruits, he must remember that they had responsibilities in the matter.
 Rev. Mr. Cumberland, of Amherst Island, also made an appeal for more men for the ministry. He said he appreciated all that Dr. Jordan had stated.
 Rev. W. T. Wilkins stated that it should receive the consideration of every member of Presbytery.
 Rev. J. D. Boyd suggested that much could be accomplished by the forming of an organization at Queen's University to take care of young men who were inclined to enter the ministry.
 Principal Ross of Queen's Theological College told of the work of the different organizations at the college were doing to secure men for the work.
 Rev. Robert Laird pointed out that the present situation was very acute for immediately supply, for some of the mission fields. A most important matter was that of providing for these fields for years to come.
 Presbytery had before it a remit from the General Assembly, asking for an expression of an opinion, on the proposal to fix the Presbytery's representation at the meeting of the Assembly at one for every ten members. Instead of one to every six, as at present, the Presbytery voted its disapproval of the proposed change.
 Presbytery voted in favor of a remit from the Assembly, for the placing of ministers on the Presbytery's roll, also favoring an overture from the British Columbia Synod to allow sessions to be represented by proxy.

Home Mission Report.
 Rev. Dr. Gracey of Gananoque, gave a most interesting report on Home Missions, which was discussed at some length. This report shows that the committee asked for an increase of about \$900 for augmented charges, within the bounds, and this is an increase of \$2,500.
 The Presbytery increased its givings for the same object by \$2,500 per annum. To bring the charges up to the minimum, the sum of \$3,400 is necessary, and as \$2,500 has been provided for, the committee asked for \$900. The report was adopted. Rev. J. D. Boyd presented a report on Social Service and Evangelism, showing progress.
 Prof. Matheson, the treasurer, reported the sum of \$606.19 on hand, and of this amount, \$140 was derived from the sale of mission property in Deseronto. This sum will be kept in the bank for the time being. The Presbytery tendered Prof. Matheson a vote of thanks in recognition of his able manner in which he has carried on the duties of treasurer.
 The call extended to Rev. A. M. Little, of Tamworth, by the congregation of McDonald's Corners, was before the Presbytery, and, after the same had been duly presented, Presbytery agreed to Rev. Mr. Little's translation. His induction into his new charge will take place on Thursday, March 28th, at 7.30 p.m.
 Rev. Mr. Rattray, Moderator of the Presbytery, will preside, and Rev. Dr. Wallace, of Kingston, will preach. Rev. Mr. Rattray will address the minister, and Rev. Mr. Parsons, of Odessa, will address the people.
Nominated Moderator.
 At the Tuesday evening session of the Presbytery, Prof. Thomas Stewart, of Halifax, was nominated as art, of Halifax, was nominated as the Presbytery's choice for the next Moderator of the General Assembly.
 The name of Prof. Stewart was moved by Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, and seconded by Rev. Robert Laird, and both the mover and seconder spoke in warm terms of Prof. Stewart, who has also been nominated for Moderator by the Winnipeg Presbytery.
 Commissioners to the General Assembly, which meets this year at London, Ont., were selected as follows:
 Rev. Mr. Beckstedt, Lansdowne; Prof. Morgan, Kingston; Rev. Dr. Robert Laird, Toronto; Rev. Dr. Gracey, Gananoque; Rev. W. J. Parsons, Odessa; Principal Ross, Kingston; Prof. Matheson, Kingston; William Clazie, Shannonville; William Moore, Plainfield; also the representative elders of Roslin, Seymour and Stirling.
 Rev. J. D. Boyd presented the report of the committee on the examination of students. There are five students who will apply for licensure, after the Queen's Convocation, and arrangements will be made for the granting of the same at a special meeting of the Presbytery to be held on April 25th.
 Rev. Mr. Kidd, of Gananoque, presented a report on religious work. Several charges failed to give a report, and this was much regretted, but the report, as submitted, showed good work. The report was discussed, and some useful recommendations adopted.
 Rev. Mr. Wilson, Napanee, reported on different matters, dealing with the budget, and Rev. Robert Laird stirred the members with his address on the need of more men to take the work in the mission fields, paying special attention to some of the charges which have been neglected in the far west.
 Presbytery decided to hold its next regular meeting in Kingston on the first Tuesday in July, at 2 p.m.
 At the luncheon for the members of the Presbytery, on Tuesday noon, Dr. Bruce Taylor, Principal of Queen's University, was introduced to the members of Presbytery, and stated that he would always be pleased to render all the assistance he possibly could to the members of that body, especially in the matter of supply.

ASSESSOR AFTER INCOMES
AND EXPECTS TO ADD TO THE CITY'S REVENUE.
 People Who Have Money Invested in Mortgages, Bonds and Stocks Are To Receive His Attention.
 City Assessor Mooers is looking into the question of income tax and finds that the city treasury is not receiving what it should. This year the total amount of Kingston incomes assessed is a little under half a million dollars, which yields about \$15,000 in taxes. Probably three-quarters of a million dollars of Kingston incomes should be assessed. If the assessor succeeds in increasing the amount of income assessment, probably from \$5,000 to \$7,000 would be added in taxes.
 It is a difficult thing to locate the sources of many large incomes, but the assessor is going to make the effort, and people who have money invested in mortgages, bonds and stocks, and who do not give a correct statement of their total incomes should be going to get into trouble. A careful examination of the city registers assessed is a little under half a million dollars, which yields about \$15,000 in taxes.
