KINGSTONIAN WHO WENT WITH ORIGINAL P.P.C.L.I. HONORED.  
Wins Colored Medal While at the Front With Railway Construction Battalion.  
An official announcement states that a military cross has been awarded to Lieut. James Archibald Foote, Railway Construction Brigade, in France. This honor comes to a Kingstonian who has been in the war zone twice.

Lieut. Foote was one of the first Kingstonians to enlist for overseas. He went as a private in the original Princess Pats, and for many months was in the trenches.

fought in the trenches in the hard battles defended by that famous unit. He was wounded finally and had to return to Canada.

In Kingston his war services were recognized to the extent of making him very valuable in recruiting work. He was in the Lindsay Battalion for a while under Lieut.-Col. J. J. Glass, but transferred to the Toronto district, and took a commission with the 25th Railway Construction and Forestry Battalion then being raised. His recruiting work in Toronto and in Sault Ste Marie on behalf of this battalion made him very prominent throughout the province, as his forceful public speaking was very effective in securing men.

Lieut. Foote returned overseas with the construction unit, and has since won steady promotion until his promotion to a captaincy is shortly to be expected.
