

Glass, but transferred to the foronto district, and took a comnission with the 257th Railway Construction and Forestry Battalion then being raised. TED WITH GAS IN HOTEL.

Employee Detected It Escaping From Their Room and Summoned Doctor-Accidentally Turned Gas On Again After Turning It Off.

Two young women in "from the country," had a very narrow escape from being suffocated with gas while they were asleep in a room at the Prince George Hotel during Wednes-

The fact that one of the night emloyees at the hotel detected gas escaping from their room, no doubt saved their lives. Early Thursday morning as soon as he found that gas was escaping the employee gained entrance to the room and aroused the two young women. They were almost ent for Dr. William Gibson. leed had a close call, The young women were told about the gas when they took the room, but tated that they knew all about it. In turning the gas off it is believed that they accidentally turned it on again. The transom was closed, and the gas had no avenue of escape.

Marquis Wheat for Farmers. The Government has 50,000 bushels of the Marquis variety of wheat for distribution among farmers. Marquis is for spring sowing and matures ten days earlier than Red Fife or any of the other varieties commonly grown in this province. It originated at the Ottawa Experimental Farm, and is highly recommended by the Gov-ernment experimentalists because of its heavy yield.
