VERONA RED CROSS WORK.

Report of Year of the Helping Hand
Society.
Verona, March 8.—The annual
business meeting of Verona Helping
Hand Society was held on Feb. 20th,
with Mrs. Yorke presiding. The fol-
lowing is the secretary's report:

Society made from material fur-
nished by Kingston Red Cross Soci-
ety nearly 1,000 articles; suits of
pyjamas, 296; army shirts, 41; "T"
bandages, 224; night shirts, 140;
abdominal bandages, 61; many-tailed
bandages, 17; crutch pads, 55; tow-
els, 44; quilts (made from left-over
material), 9. Forty-two pairs socks
were knitted from wool furnished
by Kingston Red Cross Society.

The society sent during the year
78 boxes to Verona platoon—boxes
containing socks, trench caps and
food, valued at \$204.

The treasurer's report for year
was as follows:

Miss M. Yorke and Miss Timmons,
proceeds from garden party and
quilt, \$174; received from Mrs. R.
Wagar, garden party, High Falls,
\$57; Verona garden party, \$152.70;
voluntary subscriptions, \$90.57; col-
lection Methodist church, \$5.15;
Macnee & Minnes, refund, \$10.42;
six pairs socks donated by Miss Pom-
ero, \$2.75; money from school,
\$17; total, \$530.59.

Expenses: Wool thread, etc.,
\$107.78; cash sent Red Cross, \$280;
express charges, \$3.82; printing,
\$4.75; postage and commission, \$23.
42; supplies of garden party, \$60.
42; supplies for boxes, etc., \$21.08;
value of socks donated, \$2.75; to-
tal, \$504.07; balance on hand, \$26.
52.

Quinn, vice-president; Mrs. A. Wells,
treasurer; Mrs. W. J. Geddes, secre-
tary.
