HYPNOTIST AT STRAND

DR. HUNT THE ATTRACTION AT THE THEATRE.

A Large Audience Witnessed His Performance Monday Evening—Motion Pictures Also Shown.

The Strand was packed to capacity last night and after the usual motion pictures, the celebrated Dr. Hunt, hypnotist and mind reader, gave demonstrations of his ability. He began with a brief lecture on hypnosis, in which he explained that its practice was almost universal, but in a limited degree. Individuals, by suggestion, hypnotised others and themselves, although unconscious of the fact. It was accomplished by fear, fascination and fun, and without these elements which served to concentrate the attention of the subject, any attempt would result in failure. He told how a barber, by pressing on certain nerves of the face induced sleep, and how Dr. Mesmer systematised and perfected the science. Thorough knowledge of the scientific principles involved and long practice only enabled one to achieve success. Attempts on the part of amateurs were liable to prove dangerous. It could not be learned from books. Some persons were more susceptible than others to hypnotic influence. He secured two volunteers from the audience and explained the different methods of suggestion as he proceeded in his demonstrations. He succeeded in securing satisfactory results by the senses of touch and sight.

Each amusement followed each demonstration, which was from burlesque. His exhibitions of mind reading by the use of cards were wonderful. There was no evidence of collusion.

He declared that the reports that paper could be manufactured in Canada for \$2.50 per hundred pounds were absolutely false.

Military News

Major Dunlop, 3rd Reserve Battalion, Canadians; whose home is in St. Catharines, was a visitor at headquarters on Tuesday.

Lieut. W. H. F. Ketcheson, 24th Battalion, Belleville, was in the city on Monday.

Sergt. W. J. Parks, D.A.A., sub-staff, is on a month's sick leave.

Capt. E. Bechel, late 156th Battalion, and Lieut. E. Malloch, late 20th Battalion, have been appointed to the Depot Battalion.

Capt. G. G. Stewart, C.A.M.C., who is in Canada for duty, and Lieut. T. J. Reid, 1st C.O.R.D., who is here for further medical treatment, have been taken on the strength of the C.E.F. in Canada.

Major H. H. Edwards, Brockville, who left Canada with the 156th Battalion, and who for many months has been attached to that division in England, will go to France as supernumerary captain.

Capt. C. E. McBrayne has reverted and will join the Princess Pats at the front; Lieut. Dewart Bisset will be attached to the 38th Battalion.

Captain Kenneth F. A. Williams, C.A.S.C., has been appointed conservation officer in the branch of the quartermaster-general at Ottawa. The captain returned from overseas a short time ago.

Miss Staples, of the headquarters sub-staff, is progressing nicely from her recent illness. She is still in the General Hospital.

The authorities are anxious to secure particulars of all the local nursing sisters who desire to go overseas. There are about forty in this district at present. So far twelve of this number have volunteered their services.

Nursing Sister "Gussie" Wright, one of the best known Kingstonians wearing the uniform of the Army Medical Corps nursing sisters, was on Tuesday appointed as nurse to the Royal Military College. Miss Wright is a daughter of the late Clark W. Wright, and is a sister of Ald. George C. Wright. She is a graduate of the Kingston General Hospital and was in charge of the Richardson Convalescent Home for a time before leaving for overseas. There has been no nursing sister at the Royal Military College to date, but the authorities desired one to take care of the cadets of the R.M.C. and R.N.C. who might not require hospital treatment. Miss Wright will take over this work as soon as her position at Queen's Military Hospital is filled.

There are places for a number of good men for coast and garrison duty at Halifax and for the heavy artillery at Quebec. This duty is for Canada only, and does not apply to men who come under the class now available.

Capt. O'Leary is recruiting the men, and is desirous of securing 100 men for Halifax and twenty-five for the heavy artillery in Quebec.

Capt. O'Leary was in the city on Tuesday morning, but left in the afternoon for Cobourg armories, and will be there for a couple of weeks. He is desirous of hearing from men who would like to sign up for the duty mentioned.

At present the local officers and staff of the Military Hospitals Commission are "in the air" over the time and method of reorganization of their unit. Orders state that Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie will preside at the ceremony of transfer the M.H.C.'s goods and chattels to the Army Medical Corps, the first shiftings to be on the 18th for Queen's Military Hospital. In anticipation, the staff at the hospital have everything in readiness.

Inquiries regarding what disposal will be made of the staff bring no definite information. The Whig learns that a "Clearing Depot" will be established here and that officers of the M.H.C.C. will be selected for this work. Whether this will clash with the work now being cared for by the Casualties Unit is not known. In any event the authorities are going to make every effort to use the staff and not allow it to go to waste after receiving such an experience in military work. The Mowat Hospital and the vocational work at all the institutions are to continue under the M.H.C.C., and a staff will still be necessary.
