"Under the present system it is] reasonable to say that a plow manufactured by any of the large manufacturers will be good work. The same can be said of binders and many other implements. When a farmer buys a certain make, however, he is placed in the awkward position of being compelled to purchase his repairs from the agent of this same manufacturer for the simple reason that those of other manufacturers will not fit his implement. The needed repair may be only a plow point or a similar small but vital part of a binder or reaper, but farmers in outlying districts frequently have to pay exorbitant prices for, and wait to get delivery of repairs necessary for the harvesting of his already ripened crop or have his plowing in a late season seriously delayed."

Liberty Motor Evolution.
