James Rigney Will Serve Civic Utilities Commission.

At a special meeting of the Civic Utilities Commission, held on Monday afternoon, James Rigney, formerly a member of the firm of Rigney & Hickey, grocery, was appointed collector for the utilities. His salary was fixed at \$1,600. Mr. Rigney takes the position of D. L. Gordon, who recently resigned. There were six applications for the position, including Bernard Tierney, Charles W. Mallory, D. Dennis, E. N. Powers and J. B. O'Brien.

Mr. Whiting will also make application to the Hydro-Electric Commission, for certain powers for the Commission.

The meeting of the Commission was held in private. The information regarding the meeting was handed out to the Whig by Manager C. C. Folger on Tuesday morning.

A Whig representative was on hand for the meeting, but he was asked to retire by Chairman Chown, who stated that the financial situation was to be considered and that the meeting would be private.

Funeral of the Late M.T. Company Marine Superintendent.

An Important Mortgage Action—Justice Latchford's Judgment.

Justice Latchford has given judgment in favor of the plaintiff, A. J. Macdonell, in the case of Macdonell vs. Keefer, heard at the recent supreme court sitting here. J. L. Whiting, K.C., and J. M. Farrell (Kingston) for plaintiff. P. White, K.C., for defendant. Action on mortgage for \$9,000, balance of purchase money on certain undivided interests in mining locations in townships of Scobie and O'Connor, district of Thunder Bay.

Judgment: The defendant admits the execution of the mortgage, but sets up numerous defences, which in effect, though not in form, dispute the title of the mortgage. The defendant contends that the sales of 1890 and 1892 to Macdonell were in fraud of the creditors of Thomas A. Keefer and the shareholders of the Shinnah Co. I find they were not. In five there is no defence established. Accordingly there will be judgment in favor of plaintiff for \$11,822.22, with interest at 7 per cent. from 3rd July, 1916, and costs. Stay of thirty days.

NO DIVIDENDS ON GRAND TRUNK STOCK

Holders of Guaranteed And Preference Stocks Receive Nothing For 1917.

London, March 19.—The Grand Trunk Railway Company issued a statement yesterday, deeply regretting its inability to pay dividends on its guaranteed or preference stocks owing to the exceedingly unfavorable result of the company's operations during the past year, arising from circumstances entirely beyond the control of the management, notwithstanding the fact that the company carried the largest traffic in its history.

An enormous increase in wages, fuel and all materials due a war conditions, it is pointed out, caused an immense increase in the working expenses. Every effort was made throughout the year to obtain an increase in rates in order to meet, in some measure, these serious conditions. Although these efforts were unsuccessful the board hopes that looking to the precedent established in Great Britain at the commencement of the war for the protection of British railway interests and to the proposed legislation now under consideration, by Congress regarding American railways, the Canadian Government will, in the near future, take such action as will enable the company to meet present unparalleled war conditions.
