CITY COUNCIL REFERS BACK

FIREMEN'S WAGE INCREASE QUESTION TO COMMITTEE.

Decides Not to Take \$650 Gratuity Out of the Appropriation of the Parks Committee.

The City Council last evening discussed the question of increasing the firemen's wages and referred the proposal of the fire and light committee back to that body for further consideration.

The fire and light committee recommended that the salaries and wages of the fire department after April 1st be as follows: Chief, \$1,600 a year; captains, \$2.80 a day; fourth year firemen, \$2.50 a day; third year men, \$2.40; second year men, \$2.30; first year men, \$2.20; engineer same rating as firemen and 15 cents extra a day if he does firemen's duty; stable man, 10 cents a day additional to his rating.

The committee also recommended that the team of horses attached to the steamers be sold, as they are unfit for further fire service, and that the chairman and the veterinary replace them with another team; also that the account of the Utilities Commission for street lighting be paid monthly at the rate of one-twelfth of \$20,000, the amount placed in the budget.

Ald. N. A. Smith said he was glad to see that the fire and light committee had decided to give the firemen something in the way of an increase, but the committee had not gone far enough. He moved, seconded by Ald. Armstrong, that the fire chief's salary remain at \$1,500 and that the \$100 increase proposed for the chief be divided equally among the firemen other than the captains. Ald. Smith pointed out that the second year men received no increase.

Ald. Litton stated that there was only one man in the second-year class. He thought a mistake would be made in changing the schedule suggested by the committee. The increases would not require more than the budget provided.

Ald. Corbett asked Ald. Litton if the Police Commission increased the salary of the chief of police when they increased the policemen. It did not. Ald. Corbett then saw no reason for increasing the fire chief's salary. He thought the salaries were not fairly apportioned, as the fire chief would be getting as much as the city clerk if the proposed increase went through.

Ald. Armstrong declared that the budget provided for several salary increases in the inside service. He was opposed to them, while the outside service remained untouched.

Ald. Smith stated that the two fire captains were certainly capable men, and therefore he did not think the city needed a \$1,800 chief.

On the suggestion of Ald. Chown, the firemen's wage clause in the report was referred back to the committee for further report.

Street Lighting.

In reply to Ald. O'Connor, Ald. Litton stated that the object of the committee with regard to street lighting was to pay the Utilities Commission \$1,866.66 a month. The budget provided only \$20,000, and the Commission must take that. If it refused to do so, then let it turn the lights off for a while and the people would no doubt be heard from.

Ald. O'Connor held that the better way to do would be for the committee to make an arrangement with the Utilities Commission as to a contract, but was unsuccessful. He was told he would have to wait until a certain report was ready.

Ald. O'Connor wanted the committee to meet the Commission, discuss the matter fully and make an official report to Council. His committee had such a conference two years ago and some understanding was arrived at as to capital and overhead charges.

Ald. Newman took the same ground as Ald. O'Connor. Only by a conference could an understanding be arrived at. In view of the fact that hydro power was now here, there was some hope of getting clear street lighting.

Ald. Litton remarked that all the committee could pay was \$20,000, as that was all the budget provided.

The street lighting question will be more fully considered by the committee.

properly committee were adopted: That the Council petition the Ontario Legislature to amend the Municipal Act so as to make the maximum tax for restaurants to be \$50.

That when city licenses are renewed or new ones being given that the licensee be required to give an undertaking that he will comply with the regulations which may be laid down from time to time by the fuel commissioner.

Parks Gratuity.

The Council passed the following recommendation of the parks committee:

That the resignation of superintendent William H. Phillips be accepted, and in consideration of his long and valuable services of twenty-four years at a small salary that he be paid a gratuity amounting to one year's salary, viz., \$650, and that the finance committee provide the funds.

That Arthur W. Phillips be appointed superintendent of parks at a salary of \$800 a year, and that the difference between this amount and the salary received by his father be paid out of the appropriation of parks committee.

Ald. Litton said he favored the gratuity to ex-superintendent Phillips, but wanted this amount taken from the parks committee's appropriation. The parks committee, he said, had a larger appropriation than last year. Furthermore, Ald. Litton said that the city could do with less flowers in the parks this year, and could also allow grass to grow into hay, which could be sold to the fire department.

Ald. Litton and Millan moved that the \$650 gratuity be taken out of the parks committee appropriation. Ald. N. A. Smith claimed that the committee could not stand for being charged with the gratuity. Ald. Kent held likewise. If the \$650 was taken from the appropriation, there would be so little left the committee might as well go out of business.
