

Women residents of New York state who are on active service in France, either in the hospital service or otherwise engaged in assisting the American expeditionary forces, will not lose their right to vote in that state. Commissioners will send to France to secure their ballots.

Among the first unit of Women's Overseas Hospitals, U.S.A., will be ten doctors, one dentist, one pathologist, thirteen trained nurses, ambulance drivers, four mechanics, one dietitian, one radiographer, one pharmacist and two clerks.

Miss Katherine Targue, who has been in this country for the last 26 years, has made application in Washington for her first naturalization papers. She is a British subject and has worked nearly all the time she has been in this country as a seamstress.

For the first time in the history of the United States Navy a woman has been recommended to Secretary Daniels for appointment as assistant paymaster. The woman is Miss Sue Dorsey of Washington, D.C., who is now employed in the bureau of supplies and accounts.

Regarding the ancient custom among the royal families of Japan, the present emperor of that country has selected a girl of fourteen years for the crown prince's bride. She is a member of the Imperial princely household. It has always been the duty of the emperor to choose a girl from one of the five noble families.

The marriage is announced of Kathryn Cecilia Hunt, daughter of Mrs. Johanna Hunt, Earl street, and the late John Hunt, Esq., to John Lindsay Stafford, B.A., which took place at Seattle, Wash., Tuesday, high noon, March 12th. Mr. and Mrs. Stafford will be at home after March 15th, on Lopez Island.

Money in Camphor.

Camphor groves may some day be as familiar to us as peach orchards and orange groves. Agents of the department of agriculture have found that when planted in hedges fifteen feet apart camphor trees will yield each year about eight tons of trimmings to the acre, from which about two hundred pounds of gum camphor can be distilled. At present prices that means a profit of about \$150 an acre. The camphor trees are harder than many of our fruit trees, but are suited only to the southern half of our country.—Youth's Companion.

Mary Garret Hay is known as the "Big Boss" among the suffragists in New York.

Shells, fuses and grenades manufactured in England are almost entirely done by women.

About 75 per cent. of the women munition workers in Great Britain are organized.

Women are now allowed to qualify as inspectors of small arms for the United States army.

In 1916 the number of women workers in the British munition plants increased over 700 per cent.

Over 38,000 applications for divorce have been made in Petrograd since the Bolshevik government went into power.

Mary Pickford, the motion picture actress, spends all her spare time in assisting the Red Cross in salvage work.

Miss Jane Martin, advertising manager for the largest trading stamp concern in the country, receives a salary of \$19,000 a year.

Over 125,000 women in New York city are eligible to vote at the special congressional elections to be held in that city on March 5th.

Miss Lucy Burleson, the nineteen-year-old daughter of Postmaster General Burleson, is a yeowoman in the navy at a salary of \$41 per month.

Miss Caroline Manning of the Minnesota state labor bureau claims that women who have replaced men in work do from 50 to 75 per cent. more work than the men.

For her devotion to duty while under shell fire, Miss Gladys King of Batterssea, Eng., has been awarded a military medal by the British government.

Women members of the Cherokee and Delaware tribes of Indians in Oklahoma spend a greater portion of their time in knitting for the soldiers at the front.

Women who are able to qualify as draughtsmen will be employed as ship draughtsmen by the United States Navy. Their pay will range from \$4 to \$6.38 a day.

Vassar college will be the scene of a huge training camp for nurses and it is expected that no less than 5,000 women will enroll there during the coming summer.

Because of their knowledge of French and English, four Montreal, Can., telephone operators have been engaged by the United States government to go to France to run military exchanges.

Miss Florence Hacker, for many years in office of the director of public safety in Philadelphia, is known as the "stenographer with the encyclopaedia mind," because of her phenomenal memory.

If a bathtub becomes chipped, or sometimes happens, the rough place will soon become unsightly. Get a tube of artist's oil painting flake white, and apply with the finger to the damaged spot. It makes a smooth filling, can scarcely be detected and will harden in time like enamel. Hot or cold water can be used in the tub immediately, as nothing melts or affects this paint. Window sashes which have worn shabby from having frost melt and run down the panes can quickly be made to look like new by applying a thin coat of this paint. It will wear longer than the other paint. White enamel is inclined to chip off woodwork or furniture and it can be easily touched up in the same way. There is no smell and almost no trouble, and one tube, costing a few cents, will do an astonishing amount of work.
