**THE HOLY WEEK SERVICES**

**THE ANGLICANS HOLDING SERVICES OF INTERCESSION.**

The Majority of the Roman Catholic Priests of the Diocese Will Be Here Thursday Morning.

In St. George's cathedral several special services are being held this Holy Week. All are being celebrated with regard to intercession on behalf of the Allies. To-morrow being Holy Thursday, there will be the commemoration of the institution of the holy communion, this service being at eight o'clock in the chapel. On Good Friday there will be services at eight o'clock and ten o'clock and from noon until three o'clock. A three-hour service of meditation on the seven last words from the Cross will be held.

**In St. Mary's Cathedral.**

The Roman Catholics in St. Mary's cathedral have several special services this week to commemorate Holy Week. On Wednesday evening the service of Tenebrae will be chanted. On Thursday the majority of the priests of the diocese will attend the service of consecration of the holy oils. This service is being held at 7.30 o'clock and the archbishop will preside. Friday morning at eight o'clock there will be the singing of the Passion.

**EACER FOR BULLETINS**

**WAR IS THE ONE TOPIC OF CONVERSATION IN THE CITY.**

Not Since Opening Days of Great Struggle Have People in Such Large Numbers Flocked Around Bulletin Boards—Many Inquiries From Outside Points.

The war is the one topic of conversation in Kingston. In the office, workshop, store and on the street—all other topics of conversation have been set aside, the one thing occupying the attention of all being the titanic struggle.

Not since the opening days of the war early in August, 1914, have the people in such large numbers flocked around the bulletin boards. Every day this week the Whig bulletin board has been besieged with a crowd anxious to read every line that is presented of the "doings" at the front, where, with sweat and blood, the British army is wrestling heroically with heavy odds.

The bulletins have been read and re-read. No matter how often people pass the bulletin board they stop to read and no matter if they have read the despatches before they go all over them again. Their mind is keyed on the one subject, and therefore they are content to read and read again.

Not since the war broke out have the telephones in the Whig office been kept so busy answering inquiries about the situation on the western front. Editors and reporters have given what information they could and it has been eagerly sought.

"What is the latest from the front?" This is the question that is fired at the Whig every few minutes. Indeed, the calls at times have come so fast that it has been almost impossible to answer them. And not all of the calls have been from city folk. Several have been received from Gananoque, Cayuga, Vincent and other places from people who have heard rumors and who have been very anxious to get the correct reports.

**REAL ESTATE IS ACTIVE**

**SCARCITY OF AVAILABLE SMALL HOUSES STILL BEING FELT.**

Will Not Be Quite as Many Movements on May 1st—Many People Are Buying Homes.

In speaking of the real estate situation in the city one agent said: "There will be a number of movements this year, but a scarcity of houses will prevent many people changing their residence who would very much like to."

Before the war this city had a boom and then there was a season of depression. Since then, however, there has been a season of steady growth in values, with few people buying or selling on speculation, but several investing their increased earnings in homes.

On May 1st there will not be as many movements as there have been in past years because of the scarcity of houses, particularly those of lower rents. There are several big houses in the city which have not been taken up yet, but eventually these will be filled by citizens who have prospered with the splendid trade since the war. At first the war caused many people to take smaller houses to save the difference in rental. Now with a higher cost of living there will be the same reason for them not going into bigger homes again. In some cases, however, they are ensuring future prosperity by buying homes for themselves so that in case of another wave of depression after the war they will have the advantage of being home owners.

The real estate agents as a rule are not by any means pessimistic over the prospects for a worthy institution in its great work for the soldiers and the boys in our city.
