**INDIA WORKERS WELCOMED**

SALVATION LEADERS SPOKE AT BIG MASS MEETING HERE.

Are on Their Way Back to India via Vancouver and Japan—Commissioner Richards a Visitor.

On Tuesday evening the Salvation Army Corps had a well-attended meeting as a welcome to Col. W. Stevens and a party of ten women Salvationists who are on their way to India. Commissioner Richards and Brig. Morehen were here for the event and it proved one of the most successful meetings ever held in the annals of the Salvation Army in Kingston.

The ladies in the party are the wives of Lieut.-Col. Hipsley, Brig. Claydon, Adj. Mabe, En. Mortimer and Staff-Capt. Tysley, Mrs. (Capt.) Costley, Miss (Adj.) Keron, Miss (Capt.) Duce, Miss (Adj.) Bryne and Mrs. Mabe's daughter. The party were in England on furlough until a few weeks ago, when an order was issued that they would be allowed on the Mediterranean Sea. This prevented their return by that route and they are going by way of Canada, Vancouver, and Japan, and expect to reach there by May.

In an interview and from information given by the speakers at the meeting, the Whig learned many interesting facts of the work that the Salvation Army is endeavoring to do for the natives of Britain's big colony. There are to-day over 2,000 Salvationists working in the cause of Christianity and trying to make the natives see the proper way to live and work. In one case, which the colonel recounted in an interesting way in his address, there were over 2,000 natives gathered in the folds of righteousness in a fortnight. This was accomplished by holding meetings by the officers in the villages, travelling from place to place. To ensure permanence of the work, two officers of the Army remained with the people and after erecting a building as headquarters in one of the villages looked after the work in that and in two other villages close by.

By a system of educating the children and selecting the brightest for a special course at one of the forty boarding schools maintained by the Army, new native workers are being secured.

In speaking of India in war time—the colonel left that country fifteen months ago—he said that the natives generally do not thoroughly appreciate the world menace of Germany. There are only about twenty millions of the total population who are at all educated. The army that went to form the Indian divisions in France was recruited from men without education but with more intelligence than that possessed by the ignorant, untraveled villager.

One special branch of the work was splendidly explained by one of the party. It has to do with the efforts of the Salvationists among the criminals. There are police officers appointed, but without the touch of sympathy and understanding, these have made a bad mess of the criminal question. Trouble has been experienced particularly in the north-west district, that around Punjab and Madras. The workers are now taking charge and experiencing splendid results and making these people understand the advantage of leading a better life. The speaker mentioned that Commissioner and Mrs. Hunter, who went down on the Empress of Ireland, were the first to inaugurate this branch of work, and it has since worked out satisfactorily.

During the evening Mrs. Hipsley, Mrs. Mabe, Mrs. Claydon and Mrs. Mortimer spoke of their particular work, and their addresses proved very instructive.

**STICK TO WAGE SCHEDULE**

THE FIRE COMMITTEE DECIDES TO MAKE NO CHANGE.

By-law to be Changed Providing That Firemen Shall Do Minor Repairs at Stations—To Purchase 500 Feet of Hose.

The fire and light committee yesterday afternoon decided to stick to the wage schedule it presented to the City Council at its last meeting, and which was referred back for further consideration. The committee members expressed themselves as of the opinion that the schedule was as fair as they could suggest.

It was decided to have the fire by-law amended by providing that all minor repairs required at the fire stations should be done by the men under the direction of the chief. This has been customary, but the committee thought it better to have the by-law say so.

Chairman Litton reported that the fire team, which was repaired by the chief and the city veterinary, being no longer useful to the department, had been sold for \$165. Another team is to be purchased to replace it.

The Dunlop Rubber Company was given the contract to supply five hundred feet of hose at \$1.15 a foot. In attendance were Aids. Litton, Chown, Anglin, Hewitt and White.

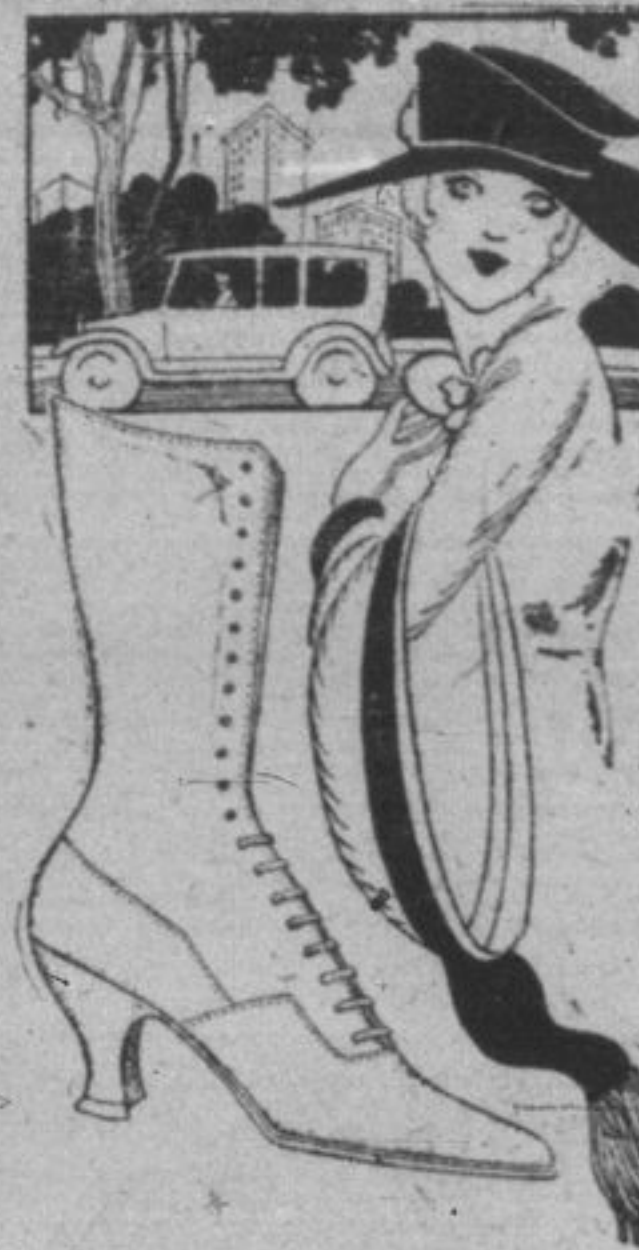
