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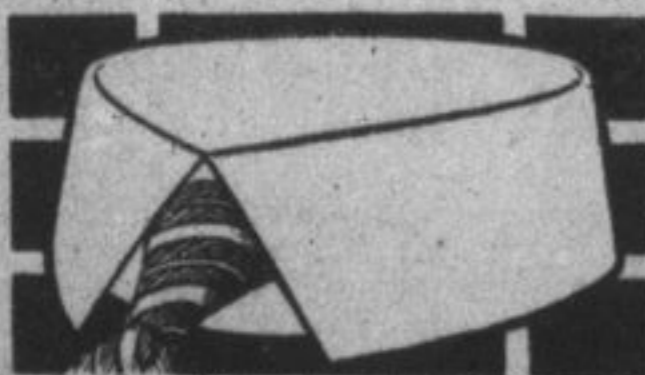

FIGURE ON SEATING 23,000 A BIG FIGHT

Hinkle and Tortorich Bid \$105,000 For the Bout.

Matt Hinkle and Dominick Tortorich, fight promoters, New Orleans, who are partners in the \$105,000 bid for the Willard-Fulton championship battle, are now busy figuring on preparing the biggest fight arena in the history of pugilism if their record-smashing offer is accepted. Tortorich already has an arena which seats over 10,000 fans, but he and Hinkle have decided to enlarge this to seat 23,000, if they stage the battle. They plan for the first time in ring history to have thousands of \$3 and \$5 seats, which will be popular prices when compared with other heavyweight championships. Ringside box seats are to sell at \$50 each and possibly \$100.

U.S. SOLDIERS TO PLAY

Baseball on an Extensive Scale This Year.

Baseball will be played on an extensive scale in U.S. army and navy training camps this year. There are more than 1,500,000 men under military training in the country to-day, and the commissions on training camp activities of the war and navy departments, which have the supervision of sports in the army cantonments and naval stations, want every single one of these men to play baseball.

And it is likely every one will, for what average American can resist the call of the diamond? This means that more baseball will be played this summer than ever before.

The season is already under way in most of the camps. The soldiers and sailors waited for no official inauguration before games were in progress on camp athletic fields and parade grounds. In fact, in places favored with a mild climate, the men have played throughout the winter.

Plans for the organization of camp teams and camp leagues are being formulated by Dr. Joseph A. Raycroft, general director of athletics in the camps, under the supervision of the training camp commission. Before another month passes the soldiers will have their company, regimental and divisional teams, and these teams in turn will form company and regimental leagues. No divisional leagues are contemplated, because of the scattered locations of most of the cantonments, but where traveling conditions permit inter-camp games will be arranged.

Similar plans for the naval stations are being made by Walter Camp, who is general director of naval athletics. Each station will have a representative team, which will be selected by elimination, and will play out schedules that are being drawn up with amateur, professional and college nines from adjacent cities. It is also possible that the sailors may play teams from nearby army camps, and engage in inter-station contests, as the stations are much nearer one another than the army cantonments.

READY FOR THIRD GAME.

Torontos Will Do Better Under N.H.L. Rules.

The stage is set for the third game of the series for the Stanley Cup at Toronto this evening between the Toronto and Vancouver teams, and there is little doubt that one of the best contests ever fought will be seen. The game is under N.H.L. rules, and, smarting under the defeat administered by the Pacific coast champions on Saturday night, there is little doubt that the Blue Shirts will take a lot of beating.

There is no doubt that Toronto fans were anything but pleased with the seven-man hockey served up in the previous game, and it is expected that to-night the exchanges will be faster, and not fraught with so much rough play. "Cyclone" Taylor, who was slashed by Randall on Saturday night, has recovered, and will be in the game to-night. Benefitting from the first game of the series, it is thought that Taylor will be more at home with the eastern game, and in company with McKay will certainly make things warm for the home club. The Blue Shirts are all in excellent condition.

DEMPSEY AFTER WILLARD.

Threatened to Knock Him Out on the Street.

Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey, the Salt Lake City lad, who is after Willard's scalp, almost came to blows in Chicago a few days ago, according to reports from that city.

Dempsey met Willard on the street, and asked the champion why he passed him up in favor of Fulton for a championship battle. This comment angered Willard, who then asked Dempsey to move. Dempsey then stepped out to the street and asked the champion to do the same thing.

Dempsey then said: "If I can't get you in the ring I'll get you on the street, and I'll guarantee you I can knock you out."

The champion laughed, and both men went away laughing.

Shocker Boosted.

Manager Fielder Jones paid a very high compliment to Urban Shocker, pitcher obtained in the trade from the Yankees, and a former member of Toronto club. The leader of the Browns stated that Shocker was one of the best natural ball players he has seen for a long time, and that if he did not prove to be a star hurler it would be not only a surprise but a disappointment.

Shocker is twenty-two pounds lighter this spring than he was at any time in the playing season of 1917. The stocky built right-

hander states that he needs to take off only a few more pounds to be in perfect shape, and he added that he is confident of having a successful year.

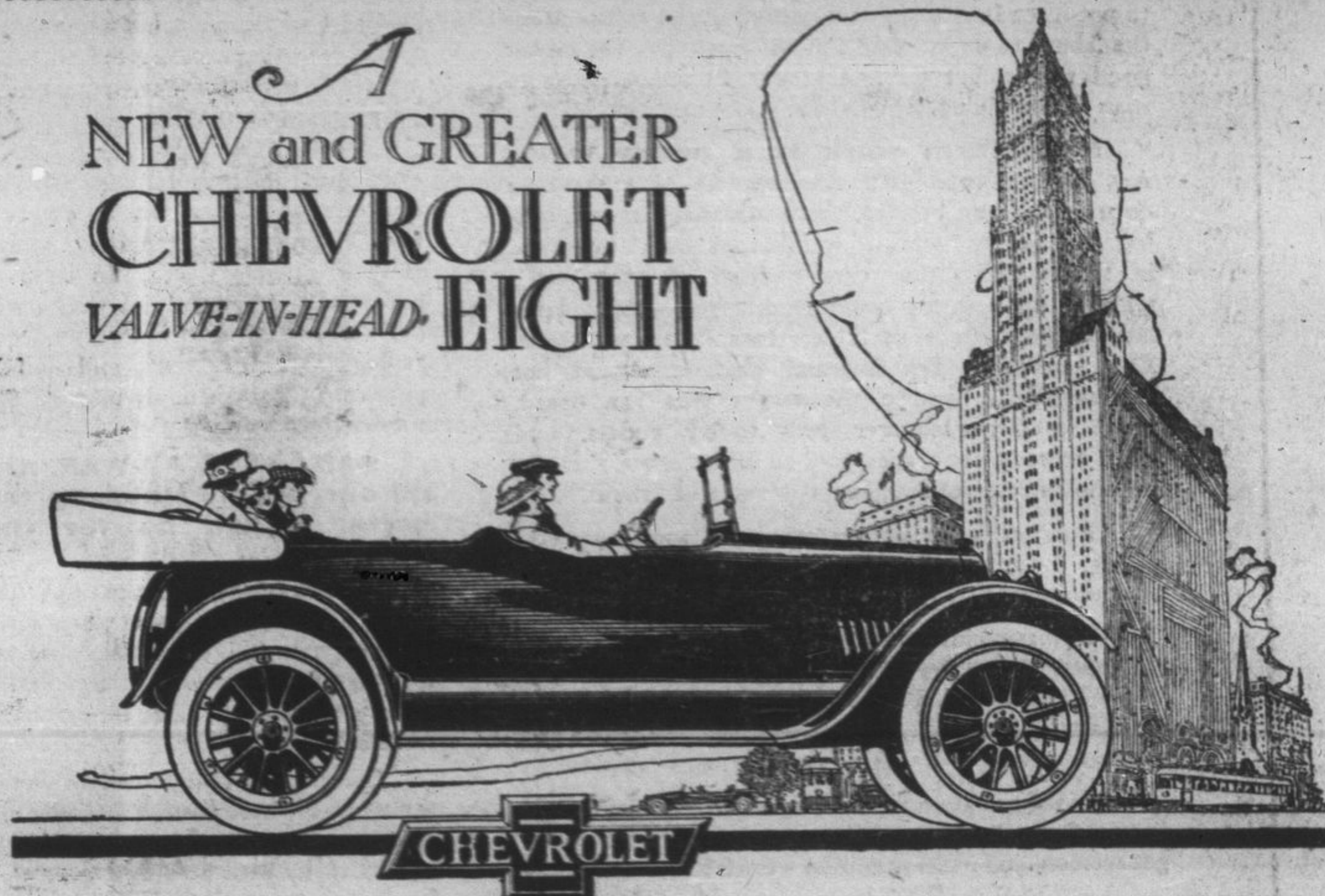
