THE MESSAGE OF EASTER

BEAUTIFULLY PRESENTED BY
 PROF. W. G. JORDAN.

Life Given in the Good Cause Not Lost — Our Loved Ones Live in Themselves and in God.

Speaking in St. Andrew's church on Sunday morning from the words of the apostle Paul, "Now is Christ risen from the dead and become the first fruits of them that slept." (1 Cor. xv, 20) Prof. W. G. Jordan said that these words come to us across the centuries as a message of hope from a man triumphing over fierce persecutions by the power of faith in God. The text is a threefold statement of the central and essential connections that sustained his soul and gave color to all his thinking.

First Jesus of Nazareth is the Christ accepted and crowned by God though rejected of men. Second, God has raised Him from the dead, proving that the cross was a victory and not a defeat. Third, this is not an exceptional miracle, but a significant event in the life of humanity, as He is the first born of many brethren and will bring many sons to glory.

Many of our forefathers felt that the Church calendar with its numerous saints' days and special observances was too heavy for them. "A sacred system had become to them a form of slavery alien to the free spirit of the Christian life. We can appreciate the fight that they made for freedom in the spirit of Paul's exhortation "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ has made you free." But in our view of this subject we may gladly admit two things, Prof. Jordan said:

First, that while too much system and mechanical organization may be oppressive and wearisome, there is something inspiring in the thought that all round the world at a particular time men of similar faith are devoutly meditating upon the same great truth. The British people everywhere have had during the past week one anxiety, one hope, one prayer. Christianity is larger than any Empire and the cry, "Now Christ risen from the dead," knows no bounds of race. Even the Russian peasant who has been trained to use it as a brotherly greeting, may feel some stronger hope in his present bewilderment. And further, "the communion of saints" is not merely a present reality; it stretches into the distant days of the past, and we claim fellowship with prophets and martyrs of all ages. The great tradition, the noble faith has not come to us through books and ceremonies merely, but through a long line of living men and women, "a great cloud of witnesses." The Christian hope of a future life is one of the most powerful of the spiritual ties that bind the members of the community into union with God and each other.

This great faith born in a small nation after centuries of divine discipline and perfected "in the fulness of time" by the gospel of Jesus Christ, has now become the leading faith of all the world. Paul believed in a new eternal Kingdom of God, and rejoiced that death could not rob the faithful of their everlasting heritage. The question is, can we translate this into our own language and find a living response in our own souls. We are pleading that God will save the nations and renew in them a larger, nobler life. But we, like men of old, must think of our loved ones who have lost their lives that truth and freedom may prevail. It is our privilege to reaffirm our faith in the simple words, "I believe in the resurrection of the dead."

The first disciples, defeated and disgraced by the loss of their Master, were lifted to loftier heights of faith by the new vision of the risen Christ; they faced their enemies and laughed at persecutions with the ringing cry, "O grave, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting."

In this larger faith there were two important elements which we can make our own. The cross stands always before us as the sign that the victory of prejudice and tyranny is only temporary. He who could not save himself because he must save others has become the saviour of mankind. It is goodness alone that really triumphs. We are compelled to regard Pilate as a contemptible coward and Nero as a coarse, brutal tyrant, but we bow at the name of Jesus, and respond to the great appeals of Paul.

The new Christian hope gave new value to the personal life as Jesus laid down his life and took it again, so men learned to believe that life thrown away in the good cause could not be lost. This hope we cherish today; we know that those whom we have lost live in the memory of their loved ones and in the deeds they have wrought, but we believe also that they live in themselves and in God. So in our darkest hours and above the din of the world's battle we lift up the cry, "Now is Christ risen from the dead and become the first fruits of them that slept."

EXEMPTION DISALLOWED.

Local Butchers Asked for the Exemption of William McFedridge.

An application for the exemption of William McFedridge, Bath Road, has been refused by the central appeal judge. This case has created a great amount of interest in view of the backing to the appeal. The applicant is an employee of Green Bros., wholesale butchers, and it was claimed that he was essential to the business. This was endorsed by a petition from all the local butchers, who pointed out the advantage of a local wholesale butcher shop to the city and that it had a direct effect in keeping the prices of meat from soaring. The central appeal judge disallowed the claim.

Some few weeks ago the roof of a blacksmith shop on Princess street, between King and Ontario streets, collapsed as the result of the heavy weight of snow, and the front portion of the shop was left standing, and is now in a very dangerous condition, and liable to fall. The dangerous portion should be removed at once.


The new schedule of fees authorized by the Ontario legislature are in force in business operations at the Registry Office.
