WHY GERMANY LOST IN WORLD'S GREATEST BATTLE

"We are at the decisive moment of the war," declared the Kaiser, on March 21st as he launched his tremendous armies against fifty miles of the Allied front in France in the greatest battle of this or any war; and on the same day he declared that "the prize of victory must not and will not fail us," and announced warningly that this prize "was no soft peace but que which corresponds with Germany's interests." A week later, when the first impetus of the colossal enslaught had made a dent twenty-five miles deep in the bending but unbroken battle-line of the Allies, General von Ludendorf, who is said to be the brains of the German General Staff, announced "that victory has been won," and added significantly "but nobody can see what will result from it."

But victory was not won, as the best informed war-writers everywhere remind him. "So long as the battle ends, as there si every prospect that it will end with our armies and those of our Allies intact and in a position as strong as they have ever occupied. Germany will have failed and failed decisively," declares Major-General McLachlan, Military Attache to the British Embassy at Wash-

Employers of This Labor Find Difficulty in Securing It.

That the employment of aliens in certain lines of industry in the city and district it a paying proposition is shown by the continued efforts b inb made to secure the foreigners. There are certain lines of work which are not very appealing to Canadians because of the hard labor, long hours and the low pay. The foreigners such as Russians take to this work aand make good for the employers.

In securing such men now there is the greatest difficulty. The supply has decreased and the general shortage of labor has made a greater demand on the few available men

The story is told that one industry curing such men. He goes all over the country, and brings them back to Kingston. Trouble has been experienced since then by other employers in mines and elsewhere offering still more money. The mineowner has his troubles, too, because many of the foreigners come back to the city to a third industry where still higher wages prevail.
