THE IRISH CONTROVERSY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

PRESENTED IN LECTURE BY LINDSAY CRAWFORD, TORONTO.

Who Spoke in Notre Dame Convent Hall on Thursday Evening Under the Auspices of the A.O.H.

Addressing a large gathering under the auspices of the A.O.H. in the Notre Dame Convent Thursday night, Lindsay Crawford, formerly of Toronto, who described himself as an Ulster Protestant Home Ruler, who had been nursed at the breast of Protestant ascendancy and Ulster Orangeism, and who in fighting his way through the fogs of prejudice to the full light of Irish nationality had not surrendered one jot or tittle of his religious faith as an Irish Protestant, covered a wide field of the Irish controversy.

THE RUSSIAN SITUATION. Employers of This Labor Find Difficulty in Securing It.

That the employment of aliens in certain lines of industry in the city and district is a paying proposition is shown by the continued efforts being made to secure the foreigners.

Trouble has been experienced since then by other employers in mines and elsewhere offering still more money. The mine-owner has his troubles, too, because many of the foreigners come back to the city to a third industry where still higher wages prevail.
