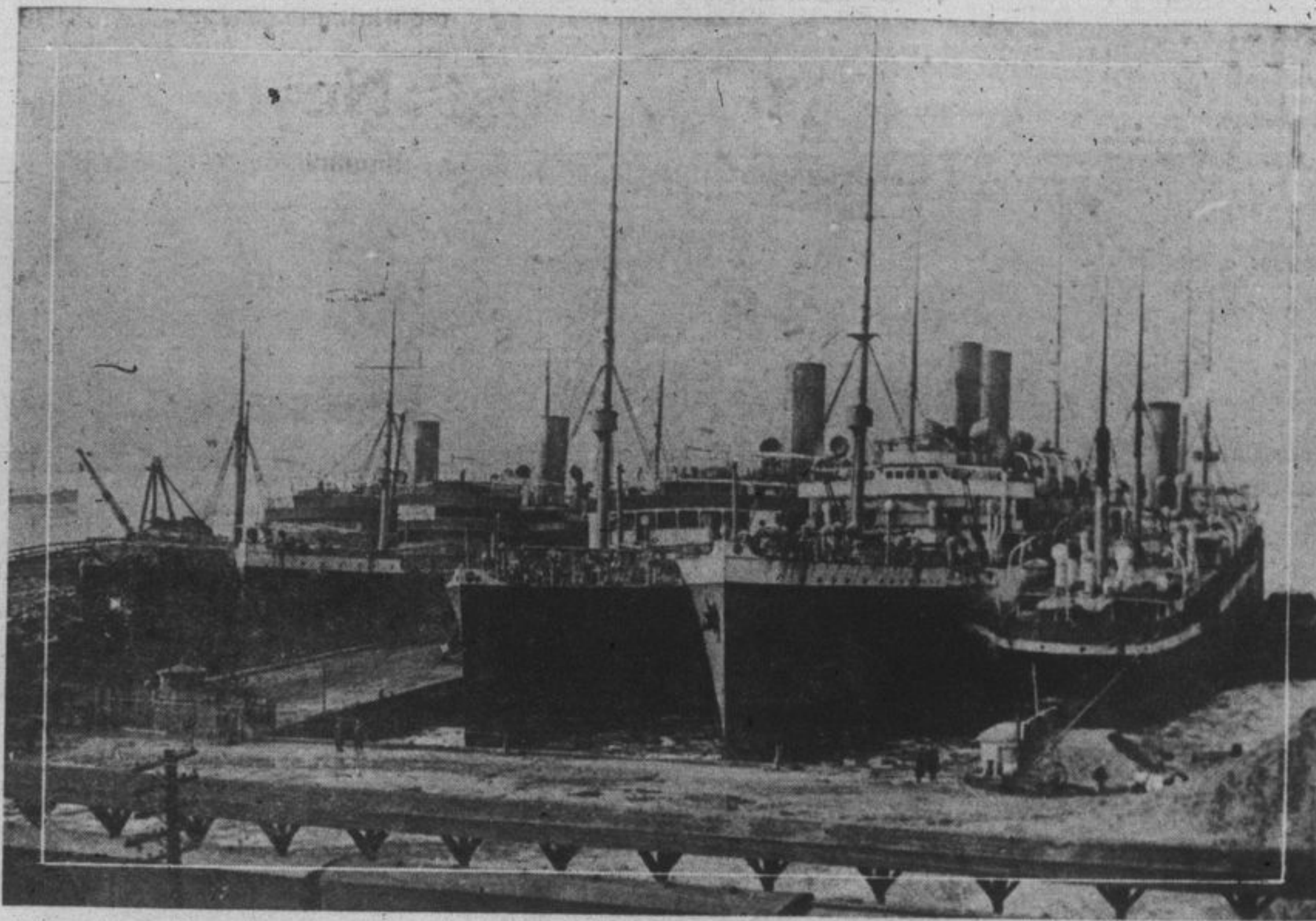

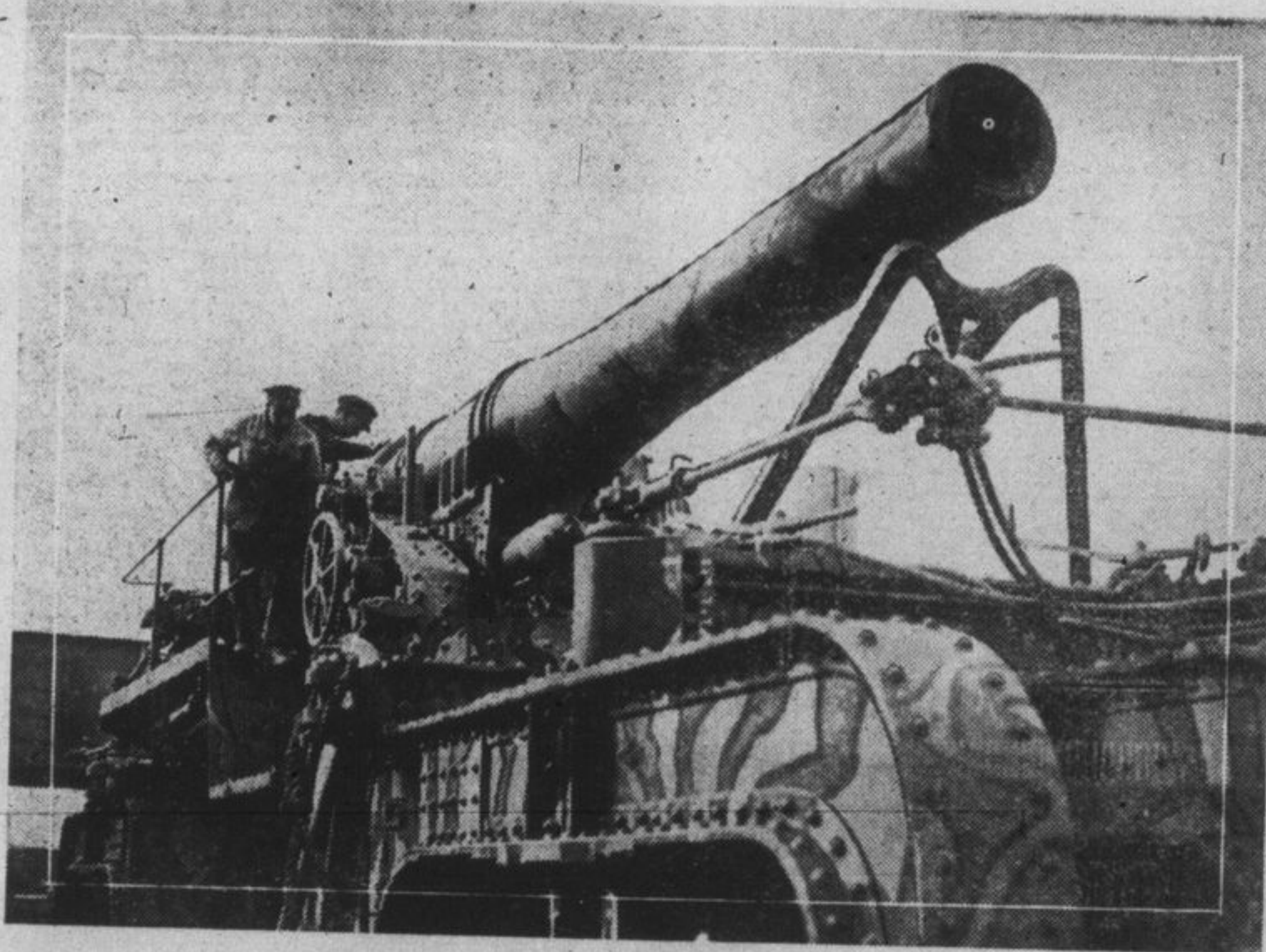
ONE REASON WHY WE ARE CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

The shipping question has been discussed perhaps more than any other for some time. These German liners which have been taken over by the United States are helping to solve this difficult problem.



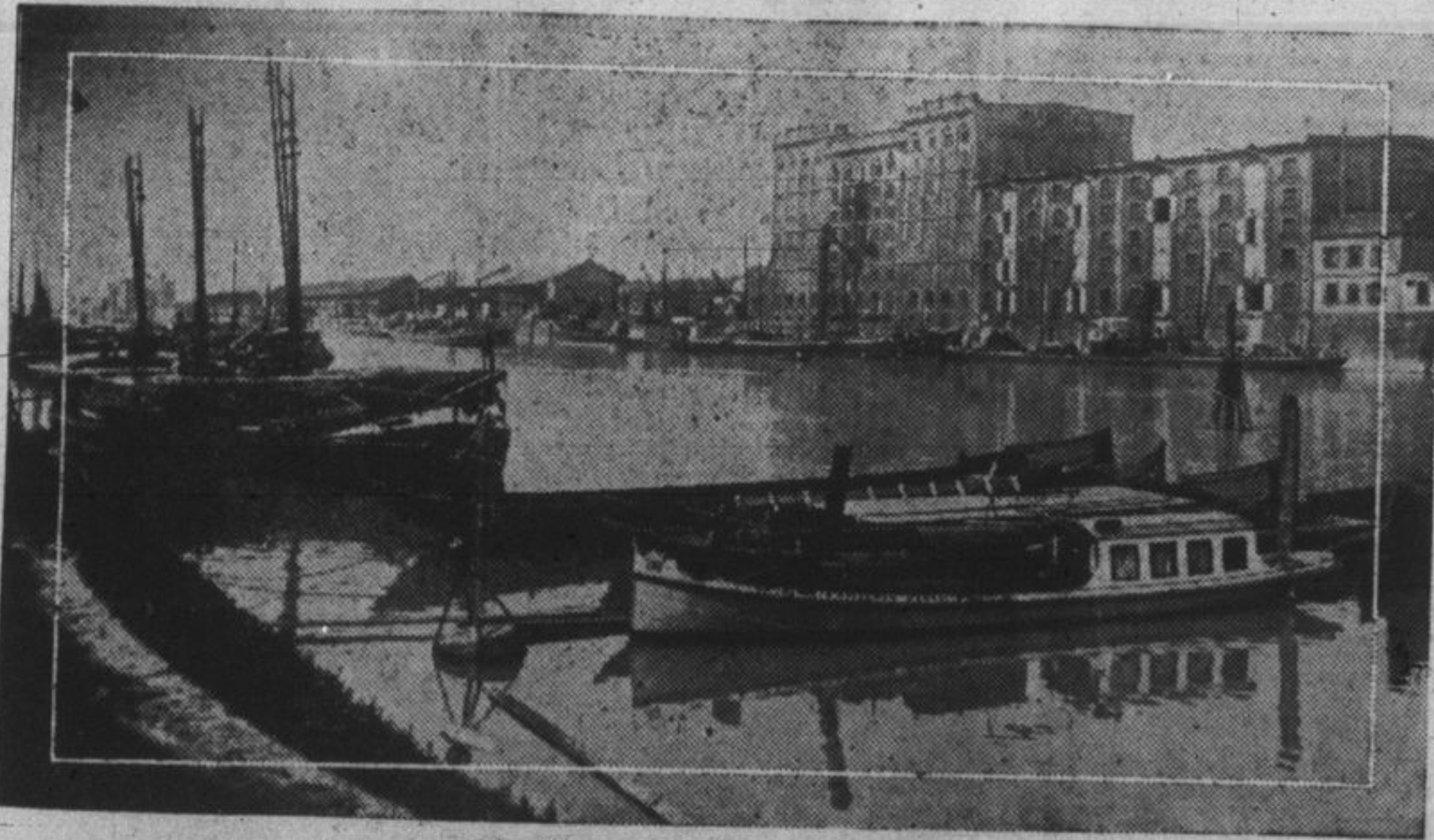
FIRERS OF GAS SHELLS WEAR MASKS

A great British gun whose voice may already be heard on the West front. This is one of the most powerful guns yet used.



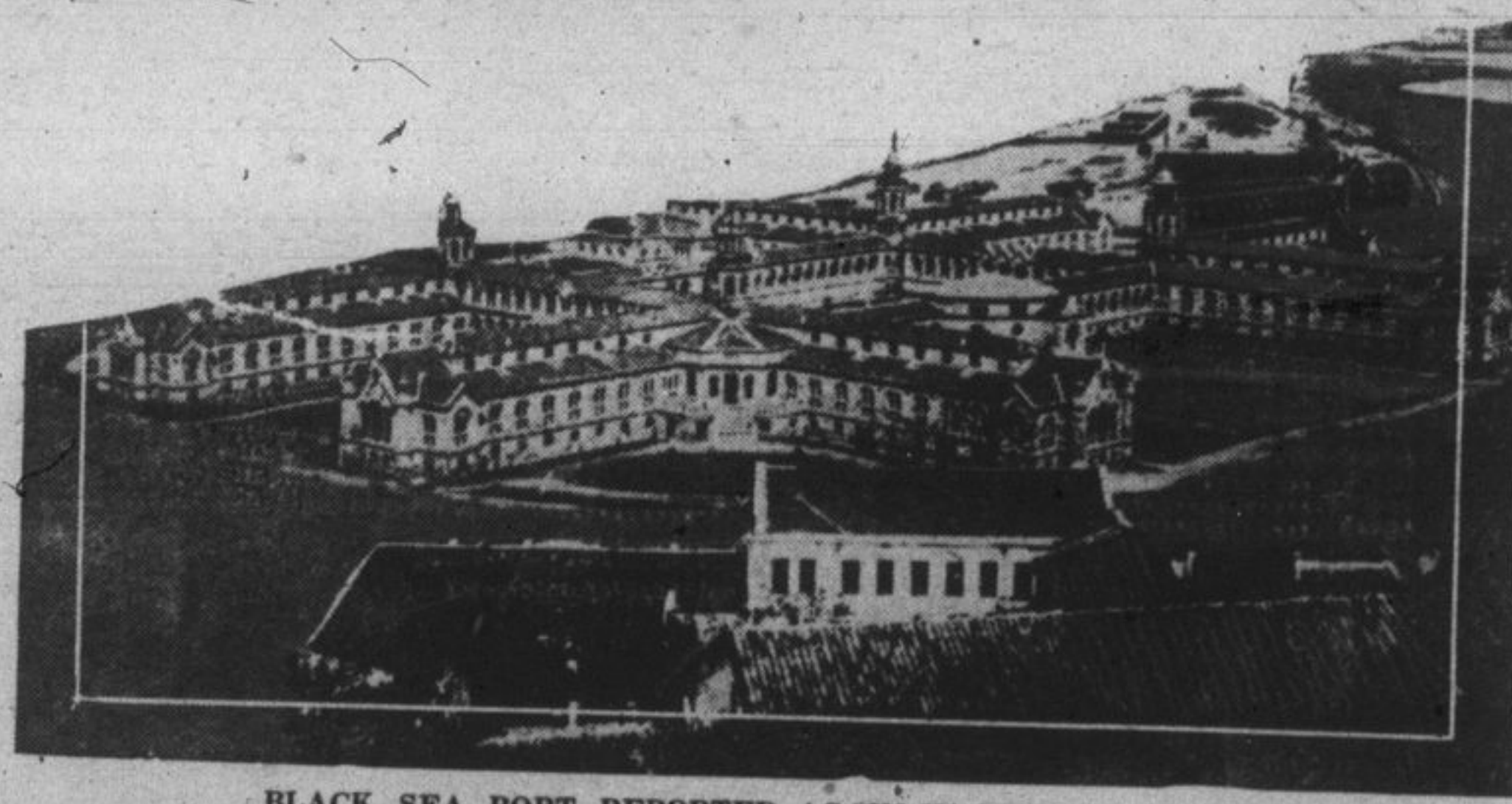
GENERAL SIR DOUGLAS HAIG
