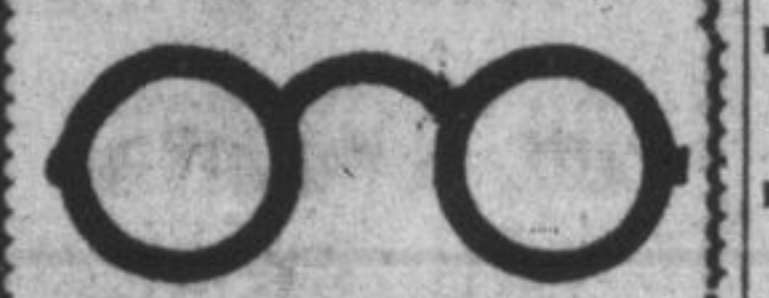

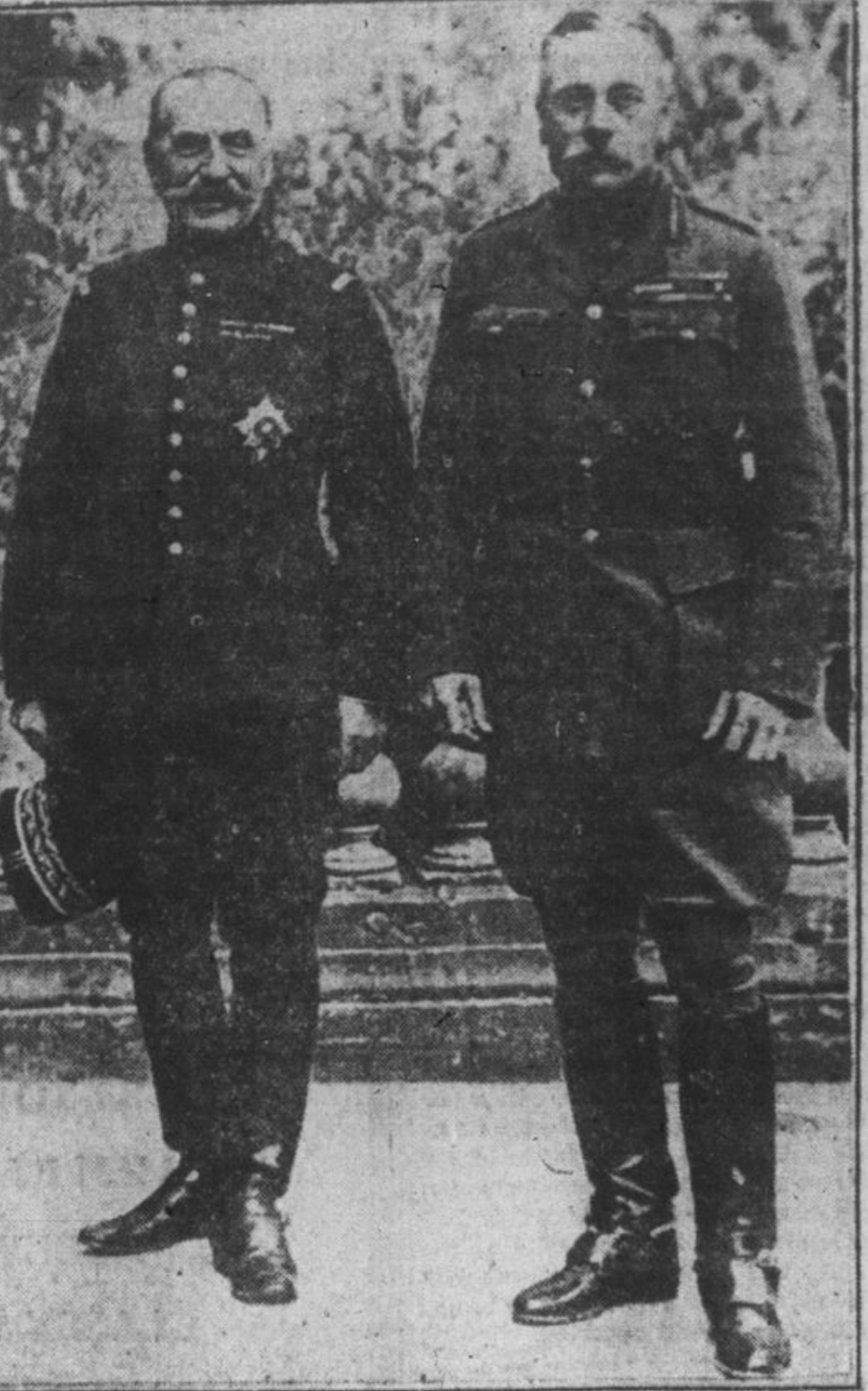

WAR TROPHIES COMING

Third Canadian Batch Ready To Be Shipped Here.

London, April 6.—There seems to be a wrong impression in Canada regarding the control and allocation of war trophies. Minister Kemp investigated the question with a view to seeing that Canadian interests were both fully provided for and protected and that there was close co-operation between the Canadian and Imperial authorities. A Canadian officer was appointed to the organizing committee of the National War Museum to attend all meetings of the War Trophies Committee. Trophies captured by the Canadians are earmarked and either allocated to the Canadian War Museum or to the War Museum or shipped to the Director of War Trophies in Ottawa. Col. Folger is the Canadian representative on the museum committee and maintains a complete record of the captures and guarantees no loss of such. Dr. Douglas supervised the shipment to Canada of a number of trophies early in 1917; a second batch was sent last November; and a third batch is now awaiting shipment.

JUMPED FROM AIRPLANE

Rodman Law Descends 2,500 Feet With Parachute.

San Antonio, Texas, April 6.—Rodman Law, balloonist and aeronaut, now attached to the Fifth Aero Squadron, yesterday jumped from an airplane at a height of 2,500 feet, and with the aid of a parachute, landed safely. He was taken up in the plane by Edward Stinson, an instructor at Kelly Field. Law is making a series of experiments to demonstrate the feasibility of jumping from an airplane.

St. Louis, Mo., April 6.—The eight-round boxing contest between Jack Dempsey and "Finky" Flynn, heavy-weights, scheduled for Monday night, has been cancelled, following an announcement by Chief of Police Young that the promoters would be arrested if the fight were staged.

Washington, April 6.—Cablegrams expressing the thanks of the French, British and Italian Governments for the willingness of the American people to reduce their wheat consumption in order that the allies and the soldiers may be fed, were received by the Food Administration yesterday from the Food Ministers of the Allied countries.

TO CUT OUT ROCHESTER. R. & O. Boats Will Discontinue Port of Call. Rochester, N.Y., April 6.—Office of the Canada Steamship Lines, the principal means of communication between Rochester and the resorts of the St. Lawrence, have been discontinued here, and the company has notified the Chamber of Commerce that rather than build a detention shed costing \$2,000 or \$3,000, which is required by the United States Government, it has decided to discontinue Rochester as a port of call. The Chamber of Commerce has made no effort to have the necessary facilities supplied for the company, feeling that the company's revenue from passengers boarding boats here fully warrants the expenditure demanded.
