LIEUT.-COL. E. C. DEAN AGAIN TRANSFERRED

Kingston Officer Now Stationed at Halifax As Chief Transport Officer.

A Halifax despatch says: Lieut.-Col. C. Dean, formerly of Kingston, has been appointed chief transport officer at Halifax in succession to Lieut.-Col. H. S. Lindsay, who will take over the management of pilots at Halifax.

Decreased Soldiers' Estates. The Department of Militia and Defence has sent a list of names of deceased soldiers to the Great War Veterans' Association asking that it be posted in a conspicuous place.

Girls Will Number About Thirty-five From Here. The "Soldiers of the Soil" movement is making wonderful progress, and already A. W. Sirett has the names, addresses and other information of 125 boys and girls who will work on the farms this year and help out the shortage of labor.

The cards filled out contain the question, "Can you arrange for your own employment?" When this question is answered in the negative, Mr. Sirett will communicate with farmers requesting assistance and place the boy or girl.

In an interview he said, "There will probably be well over 150 boys and girls in this city who will answer the S.O.S. call to the farm. Of this number possibly thirty-five will be girls, which shows that they are anxious to do their bit as well as the boys. Many of the pupils are farmers' children, and will therefore, work for their parents, but a great many of the forms show that the applicants are city children with no farm experience."
