A BIG DRIVE IN KINGSTON INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

IN THE INTEREST OF THE MILITARY Y.M.C.A. FUND.

A Committee of Prominent Citizens Taking Up the Matter—May 7th, 8th and 9th the Dates Chosen.

That Kingston will do its bit in the national appeal by the Military Y.M.C.A. for \$2,250,000 which is to be made shortly and concluded with a big three days' drive on May 7th, 8th and 9th, was assured when at a representative meeting of citizens in the mayor's office on Tuesday afternoon a strong general committee was formed and the plan given the hearty approval of the meeting.

Ever since the war began the affairs of the military Y.M.C.A. in this city have been administered through a general secretary, who has had to co-operate with and assist him a local committee composed of W. R. Givens, Lieut.-Col. W. H. Macnee and C. A. Macpherson. When word came of the contemplated campaign—a national one—for over two million dollars, the local committee felt that this was a matter which the city and citizens generally should take up, and accordingly the mayor was asked by the local committee to call a meeting to get the work started as soon as possible. This he readily consented to do, and the meeting was held in his office, when the general purpose of the campaign was outlined by W. R. Givens.

Notwithstanding the many other attractions, the interest in the evening meetings in the Gospel Hall has been well maintained. Neither Mr. Taylor or Mr. Irving etc. at all sensational preachers. Stanley Hunter was connected with Bethel Congregational church and Sunday school. Since he went overseas both his mother and sister, Gladys, have died. He is survived by his father, one brother, Hilton, and one sister, Myrtle.
