So far the local farmers do not see the practical value of tractor buying, and only two purchases have come known to A. W. Sirett, district agricultural representative. To Remove Warships. Petrograd, April 10.—In reply to a protest of the Smolny Institute against the landing of German troops in Finland, Germany has sent a wireless ultimatum demanding in accordance with Article 5 of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, the removal or disarmament of all Russian warships in Finnish waters by noon April 13th. The Smolny Institute has ordered the commander of the fleet to accede to this demand.

HOW MANY IDLERS ARE IN KINGSTON?

Many Idlers Are a Part of a Floating Population of Country. How many idlers are there in Kingston? This is the question that is being asked to-day, in view of the legislation put through at Ottawa, to compel every man between the age of 16 and 80 to be engaged in some "useful occupation."

It is pointed out that many idlers are generally part of a floating population, which does not stay very long in any place. In addition to the habitual idler, there is the casual idler. He is called a casual because at certain times during the year he does show spurt of industry by holding down a job for a short time. It is this class that generally fall for what is known as "spring fever."
