MORE RESTRICTIONS.

Shippers Into United States Must Now Procure a License.

According to instructions received rom Washington by the American Consul at Kingston, shippers are required to procure from the War-Board at Washington a license for the following articles: Hay, plumbago, cobalt ores and metals, poulty eggs, animals, pyrites, dry vegetables, fluorspar, and fresh meats. The number of license must appear on the consular invoice, or their admission into the United States will be denied by the customs officials;
