C. K. Munis on Dark Cornish; C. S. Anglin on Black Minorcas (he showed eggs from these birds, which weighed three ounces each); J. G. Patterson on Partridge Wyandottes; F. J. Coldham on Plymouth Rocks; and James Holland on Langshans.
