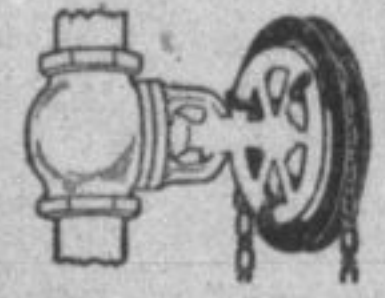

GO TO JAIL RATHER THAN TELL WHO GAVE IT TO THEM

Ontario Temperance Act Giving Much Trouble To Tipplers Who Cannot Do Without Their "Bitters." The fact that the "lid" is on tight regarding the sale of intoxicating liquor, is going to make things pretty hard for some people who cannot do without their "bitters."

Some few weeks ago a young man—not many years out of his teens, stood before Magistrate Farrell, accused of being intoxicated. He pleaded guilty, but when asked the old old question, which the magistrate puts to all the tipplers in these days of rule under the O. T. M.: "Where did you get your liquor?" The unfortunate young fellow told a rambling story about getting it at a home on — street. He did not know the name of the party who served him.

"I'll just give you a few days to brush up your memory," remarked the cad, and the accused went to jail.

The chap, who loved his whiskey, refused to give the name of the party who had given it to him. He was even ready to go to jail before he would tell.

However, the jail is not a pleasant place, as all unfortunates who have happened to fall in the police net can tell you, and this young man went in for the first time. He spent the most of his time in thinking. It was for that special object the Magistrate sent him to jail. He was sent there on remand. He had no work to do, and therefore he was not compelled to work, and he had lots of time to get his "thinking cap" in good working order. For two weeks he thought over the matter, but he would not give in to tell the name of the man who sold him the bottle of liquor. Even at the chance of securing his liberty he did not want to be a tell-tale.

He entered his third week. The question bothered him night and day. Will I tell? This was the question that was ever before him. "Yes I will," he finally declared, and he was brought before the magistrate. He was thereupon fined \$10 and costs with the option of a month in jail, a dear friend who covered his fine and he was not compelled to go back to jail. He gave the name of the man, whom he claimed, sold him a bottle of whiskey for \$2.

This story shows just how far a man will go to get his liquor and shield the man who is guilty of a very serious offence, in having sold the liquor.

From time to time, men go to jail rather than give away the name of party who gave them strong drink.

Amendment To Temperance Act.

An important amendment to the Ontario Temperance Act appears in Section 26 and is of special interest to druggists and grocers. It reads as follows: "No essence, tincture, compound or flavoring extract containing alcohol is to be sold except in bottles containing two and a half ounces and record of sale must be kept in a book." The sale of any tincture or any extract of ginger except to a person having a permanent place of residence and only on an affidavit that it is only to be used for domestic purposes renders the vendor liable to a penalty of from \$50 to \$300.
