BANKER BRANDS EFFORT GIRLS! ACT NOW! HAIR COMING OUT MEANS DANDRUFF

OF HEARST TO "SQUARE THINGS" WITH CANADIANS.

As a Fabric of Falsity—James F. Macdonnell of Pasadena, Cal., flips the Foliage From the Hearst Camouflage.

The following from the Times of Los Angeles, California, has preference to James F. Macdonnell, a nephew of George M. Macdonnell, K.C., of Kingston, and a graduate of Queen's University. The article follows:

The Times has received copies of the following correspondence between M. F. Ihmsen, publisher of William Randolph Hearst's Los Angeles Examiner, and James Macdonnell, vice-president and cashier of the First National Bank of Pasadena: PASADENA, Cal., March 1, 1918. Los Angeles Examiner: Los Angeles, Cal. Gentlemen:

I have your letter of February 28, beginning as follows: "A committee of Canadians has requested us to send to you an editorial page of the Examiner, recently published, which contains an editorial sentiment relative to Canadians and Americans that this committee feels 'sure would be of interest to you,' and your letter ends by stating that the ban on the Hearst papers and the International News Service has been lifted so far as England and all British dominions are concerned. I believe that your letter begins and ends typically with a misstatement. No committee of Canadian requesters to send out your advertising matter. There are not enough renegades here to form a committee. As for your last statement, that your service has been restored and your paper admitted to loyal Canadian homes, the refutation comes in the morning's Associated Press as follows:

Toronto, (Ont.) Feb. 28.—(By Canadian Press.)—"There is no truth in the report that the ban has been lifted on the Hearst publications of the International News Service," said Col. Chambers, chief editor for Canada, in reply to a question on this point. "I am aware of the fact that a report of this kind has been circulated, but there is not a word of truth in it. The regulations are still being rigidly enforced in Great Britain and Canada."

With regard to your editorial of February 7, enclosed, I have two observations to make. First, a Hearst paper would print anything once, even something loyal to America and her allies, for the sake of circulation, and he would be an egregious ass who would be taken in by such a simple stratagem. I presume you sent the German Ambassador many editorials with the same business, and in view of the fact that you are not a chief-attempting and lying propagandist that is the utmost you dare these days.

Believe me, you cannot curry favor with any true Canadian by attempting with ill-disguised venison to stick a wedge between that country and the mother land for which she has shown her willingness to do. Every Canadian is proud of the way in which the land of his birth has risen to its destiny, but he would be suspicious of your aid in showing that destiny. Flattery from a foreigner is the only thing for which Canadians need apologize, is foolish and useless. Their loyalty to Britain is their overmastering sentiment. If your hatred of all things British did not make you a purblind, the war would have taught you this much.

There is a certain animal not unknown in Los Angeles county whose presence is known not by sight but by the use of other senses, and only children of tender years mistake it for a pet. I would like to see you, Examiner, if I could help it, in my back yard.

If my views seem to you not representative, I would suggest that Mr. Hearst inform himself by stepping off a train either at Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver or any Canadian point and make his identity known. But preferably he might step off either in Berlin or anywhere in the United States while the train is moving, say, sixty miles an hour.

Dear Sir: A committee of Canadians has requested us to send to you an editorial page of the Examiner, recently published, which contains an editorial sentiment relative to the Canadians and Americans and to Canada and the United States that this committee felt sure would be of interest to you. Many false impressions were given by newspaper rivals of the Hearst papers throughout the country relative to the attitude of the Hearst papers towards Canadians and Canada. As a matter of fact, the Hearst papers have been conspicuous among the larger American publications in their appreciation of Canada, its vastness, its possibilities and the opportunities it offers, and its significance in social, economic and political life to our own country. The Hearst papers for years advocated closer commercial and social relations between the two greatest countries of the western hemisphere.

The objection the Hearst papers made during the last year of the war to the British censorship, which the Hearst papers felt was unsafe from the standpoint of Great Britain's own interest, resulted in the closing of the cables to the International News Service, but this prohibition, after careful consideration by the British government, has been lifted, and the International News Service now has full cable and postal privileges in England and all British dominions and commonwealths.

The City Beautiful

"Kingston looks best in summer," is a remark often heard, but it is difficult to discover whether the tone of voice indicates pride or apology; pride in her situation on the waterfront and the landscape picture presented by homes half concealed amid the foliage of many beautiful trees, or apology for defects revealed by her nakedness ere the kindly vegetation has clothed anew. The saying is true nevertheless. Her situation is ideal, and the summer climate is all that one could desire. The waterfront describes an arc around at least half of the city, affording a beautiful view to many homes and boating to all possessing the leisure and inclination to indulge in it.

The plan of the city is good, with one great exception, which is indeed a defect. The railway terminals are badly situated, as the tracks cross the approaches to every wharf. There should be a union station at the hay market, the lumber yards being removed to a more suitable locality beyond the residential streets. The city should acquire all the land in front of the City Hall down to the water and remove the railway station and freight sheds to make a boulevard. These changes would add greatly to the beauty of the city.

Right here the question arises, "Do we fully appreciate the value of beauty—that consistent efforts to this end on the part of all citizens will aggregate millions of dollars? Lack of foresight now will surely entail the cost of millions in future years.

Let us consider our streets—streets with dilapidated buildings; crooked streets, all bearing the mark of repair and the annual removal of mud. Their effect is depressing to the citizens, and alienates the casual visitor. It is the telephone and telegraph companies have rights to erect poles, but is it not time to consider negotiations with a view to effecting the removal of poles and wires?

The city parks are beautiful in themselves and the value in which they are held by all citizens is apparent on summer holidays and Sundays. They afford breathing spaces in hot weather for all who live in crowded localities. They are easily accessible to mothers with infants and children, but if a portion of each park were fitted up as a play ground having elevated slides, etc., their value in promoting activity and health would be enhanced. The water front does not afford sufficient bathing space, but this cannot be remedied. Dressing rooms have been provided, the only available site, and hundreds of lads and lassies have learned to swim there, but two or three more dressing rooms might be added this year.

Much can be done to improve the appearance of the city. On nearly every street there are buildings which should be removed, as they are not only an encumbrance but a menace to the more modern buildings occupying adjoining lots. Many of them were built long ago of wood and plaster, and appear to be beyond improvement. Their presence discounts the value of all property in their vicinity.

Improvements to the roadway of many of the streets would add greatly to their appearance. Permanent sidewalks have been laid on nearly all streets, but a permanent macadam roadway, properly surfaced, would eliminate much of the mud that now accumulates in wet weather. All streets that have been so treated give cause for some pride. Look at Barrie, University avenue, and Aberdeen. These show the wisdom of those who carried out the work. Many smaller cities are in advance of us in respect to streets, but none present a better appearance than the parts of Princess, Wellington, Brock, King and Clarence that were permanently paved some years ago. Receptacles for paper and other litter might be placed at convenient places, however.

The interest of the individual must be aroused if good appearances are to be kept up. For some months the basement windows of a building on Brock street were stuffed with straw, indicating an indifference to appearances which should be remedied. With the approach of summer individuals can by thought and little effort contribute greatly to the general appearance of lawns and buildings.

Within the past three or four years a remarkable change has taken place in the grocery and fruit stores, in fact, in the internal display of all stores. The banks compare favorably with those of most cities, but in some offices where business is transacted there is still evidence of a disregard for appearances which does not give the impression of efficiency.

The above outline will doubtless suggest many plans of improvement to our citizens, and the earnest co-operation of all is desirable in order that Kingston may occupy a front place among the beautiful cities of Ontario.


