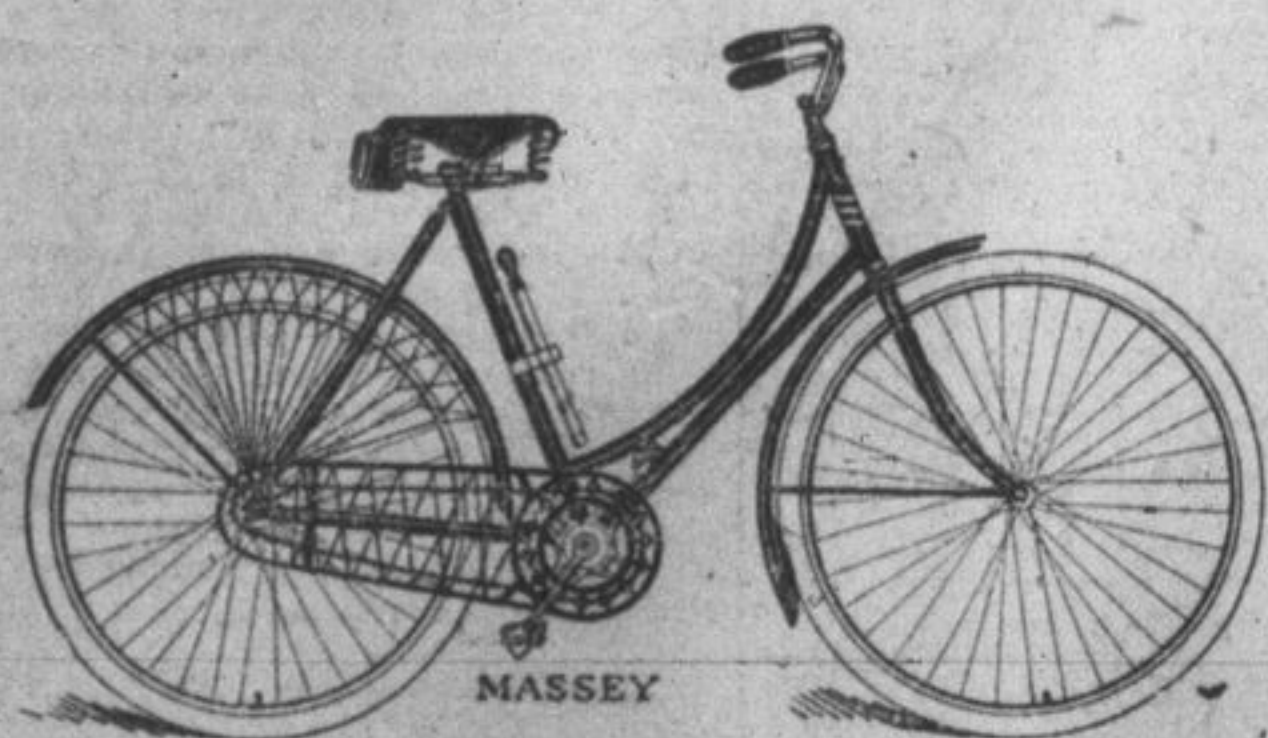

BASEBALL IN SPAIN.

Spaniards From Cuba Introduce Game in Spanish Capital.

Baseball is commencing to catch the fancy of Spaniards. A baseball club, called Madrid's Stars, has just been formed, under the Presidency of Senor Fernandez, and will compete soon with a club of amateurs of the military school of Toledo.

POOL THE PLAYERS TO MAKE LACROSSE

Ottawa Idea Is to Follow the Coast Hockey League Plan.

One of Ottawa's veteran lacrosse players makes the suggestion that if another effort was to be made to make the national game go in Montreal, Ottawa, Cornwall and Toronto, that a league should be conducted on the same plan as the Patriots run their Pacific Coast hockey circuit. He says what players there are available should be pooled so that three or four teams of equal strength would be put on the field. A real race for the championship would result and the fans would again turn out.

The Journal-Press says of the proposal:—"The plan is all right to a certain extent, but to make it a success one, two or three enthusiasts with considerable capital would have to take the thing in their own hands, put up the money to get the thing going, switch the players around and collect the profits, if any. Individual clubs will never be able to make a success of lacrosse again. As a rule they are too selfish as to their own interests and forget about the other fellows."
