A TRAIN LEFT THE RAILS

PASSENGERS ON C.N.R. CAME TO THE CITY ON ENGINE.

Spreading Rails Blamed For Wreck of Train Near the Cataract Creek—No One Injured.

About five o'clock on Friday afternoon, the passengers on the Canadian Northern afternoon train coming to the city were startled by a jarring of the coaches and when the train had stopped it was found that four cars, the baggage car and a truck of a passenger coach were off the rails and had torn up the track for almost a quarter of a mile. The engineer, however, had realized the danger and stopped his train in time to save the coaches from being overturned, and no person was hurt.

The cause of the accident is attributed to spreading rails and heavy Cataract Creek, which is about three miles north of the G.T.R. diamonds. The passengers on the train were brought to the city on the engine and reached here about six o'clock.

On Saturday morning C.P.R. wrecking equipment was engaged in cleaning up the wreck and in spite of the badly torn right-of-way, it is believed that traffic will be resumed on Saturday afternoon.
