BATTLE OF LANGEMARCK INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

THIRD ANNIVERSARY MARKED BY SPECIAL SERVICE.

Army and Navy Veterans Placed Wreath on Tablet Erected in Memory of the Late Capt. Charles Milton—Commissioner Richards Took Part in the Service.

In spite of the inclement weather, the Salvation Army Citadel was filled Sunday afternoon, at the special service held to mark the third anniversary of the Battle of Langemarck, and for the placing of a floral wreath on the tablet erected a year ago to the memory of Capt. Charles Milton, a member of the Salvation Army, who was killed in action on the Somme, in 1916. The gathering was held under the auspices of the Army and Navy Veterans.

The Salvation Army had some distinguished visitors to mark the occasion, including Commissioner W. J. Richards, territorial commander of Canada East; Col. McMillan, chief secretary, and Mrs. McMillan, Brigadier and Mrs. Morehen, and Adjutant Burton.

Addresses were given by Commissioner Richards, Mayor J. M. Hughes, Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie, and Major C. I. Campbell, Brig.-Gen. Hemming, and W. F. Nickle, M.P., were to have been present to deliver an address, but they were unable to attend. Lieut.-Col. Gillespie spoke on behalf of Brig.-Gen. Hemming.

The service throughout was a most impressive one. As the wreath was placed on the tablet by representatives of the Army and Navy, Trooper Latisler and First Petty Officer Leyman of the Salvation Army band, under Adjutant Smith, played the favorite hymn of the deceased, "Lead Kindly Light," while the audience stood with bowed heads. Following the singing of this selection, Brigadier Morehen offered prayer. The various speakers paid a warm tribute to the gallant officer who gave up his life on the battlefield. Interesting stories were told of his service as chaplain at Barfield camp during the summer of 1915, and of his eagerness to get on the firing line; how he had played the part of the man in all his undertakings. He was beloved by all his acquaintances and stood for all that was good and noble.

Commissioner Richards, in a most inspiring address, spoke of the three principal elements which go to make for the best manhood and womanhood, namely, to be vigorous, physically, mentally and spiritually. During the service, the band played several fine selections, and Mrs. (Adjutant) Smith sang very sweetly, "There Are Shadows on the Hill," but there's Sunshine on the Hill." Col. McMillan gave a scripture reading. The service opened and closed with the singing of the National Anthem. An offering amounting to \$104 was collected to help defray the expenses incurred in the special services. A large number of veterans occupied seats on the platform.

Commissioner Richards and the other Army officers were given a civic reception on their arrival, Saturday afternoon. The Army band was at the station and the local Army officers, under Adjutant Smith, were present, to extend a welcome along with Mayor Hughes. Afterward the veterans called at the Memorial Hospital, Osgowanda Convalescent Home and Elmhurst Convalescent Home.

A very interesting event, and one for which a great deal of praise is due, was put on at a meeting held in the citadel on Saturday night, when the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides of the Army, under Lieut. Rogers, constructed a bridge which stretched from one side of the hall to the other. The structure was put together in the record time of fifteen minutes, and showed quick and careful work.

Commissioner Richards gave a stirring address at the Sunday evening meeting in the citadel.

At the annual spring convocation of Queen's University, to be held on Wednesday, the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity will be conferred on Rev. A. H. Scott, of Perth, who gained the degree of Master of Arts from Queen's University in 1878. Rev. J. H. Buchanan, of Babaco, India, will be similarly honored by the university. Rev. Dr. Buchanan received his degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1885 and his degree of Doctor of Medicine from the Medical College in 1888, graduating with the present dean of the faculty, Dr. J. C. Connell. For many years Rev. Dr. Buchanan has done noble service in the medical missionary field in India.
