GIVEN AT QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY BY PRINCIPAL TAYLOR.

Admonished the Graduates to Give Their Best to Their Country—Death But the Beginning of Life.

That in the years of study at the university a person gains the richest gifts in this life, was the theme of a splendid baccalaureate sermon in Convocation Hall on Sunday afternoon by Principal R. Bruce Taylor. The graduating class attended in a body and the auditorium was filled with citizens and students.

"In the days to come when you look back upon your college-associations," said Principal Taylor, "the university walls will be made golden with the memories of friendships made and you will be stirred to greater endeavour." The college training is the foundation of the citizen's life for in the halls of the university and on the campus rivalries and friendships are made which are the keynote to the life beyond. These opinions are formed unswayed by prejudice and self-interest, and the balanced judgment so needed in national life of the future when extremists and irresponsible radicals will try to speak for the majority is attained.

To the graduating class the principal said that they were now being severed from the happiest days of their existence. Just as the man from Scotland never forgets the homely life and simple outlook of his rugged native land, but maintains throughout the staunch personality that characterizes the race, so in retrospect Queen's University will never have a rival for its graduates. The memory of the joy of youth, the acknowledgement of the intellectual gifts received, the recognition of the advanced ideas pronounced, and the thought of the stirring spirit developed will all flood back to mind in the future when one seeks to learn what the college days really meant.

"Some of you," concluded Principal Taylor, "will be called into private life. To you, I would say, enter and give of your best to your country. Some will remain in private life. There, too, you may honour your Alma Mater. Some others of you will be called into the service of your country. I know that you will respond gladly and loyally like so many hundreds of others who have been called into the service of the nation. If need be you will make the great sacrifice with the knowledge that death is but the beginning of life."
