Baseball Briefs

Joe Schultz, late of Toronto, who has signed with Kansas City, says the weak arm that cost his place in the big show is alright again as a result of a visit to Bonesetter Reese during the winter, and he expects to play such ball with Kansas City that he will be back up again before the season closes.

It's back to Baltimore for Catcher Ben Egan. The Little Rock Club bought him from the Newark Internationals, but he refused to report, so now he has been resold to the Baltimore Club of the New League. His place at Little Rock will be taken by Catcher Bill Reynolds, purchased from the Richmond Internationals.

George F. Johnson, the millionaire shoe manufacturer of Binghamton, who had said after last season that he was done backing a ball club, has come to the front again and will finance a team for Binghamton in the New International. He has named Charles (Chick) Hartley as manager of the team and told him to go out and get the best players available.

The Memphis Southern League Club has taken on Joe Slattery to play first base. Last year Slattery was with Montreal and that club recently sold him to Toronto, but Slattery banks on the National Commission decision declaring former international players free agents and has ignored the deal that Lichtenhein

and McCaffery fixed up for his services.

REVIVE LACROSSE IN WEST

Two-team League and Minto Cup Play For British Columbia.

Vancouver and New Westminster lacrosse officials have made another step forward in their move to revive the national game on the coast. The New Westminster players definitely decided to field a team against Vancouver, elected Gordon Spring manager and unanimously agreed to organize a second team to be composed of junior and intermediate players and Con. Jones, representing Vancouver, will draft a season's schedule.

May 24th is the tentative date fixed for the opening. The New Westminster players at the meeting decided to ask W. K. George of Toronto, Minto Cup trustee, for permission to defend the trophy this season.

No Polo at Thousand Islands.

Present indications are that the field of the Thousand Islands Polo Club, on Wellesley Island, on the St. Lawrence River, will be a deserted field during the coming season, says the Watertown, N.Y., Times. The war, which has invaded every realm of sport, has called to the colors nearly every member of the team that first brought the sport to this section. Many other men prominent in the sport and members of teams which played against the Island poloists are also serving with the Canadian or American forces. It is not expected that another team will be organized at the Islands this year and the sport will probably be forgotten until after the war.

IF DARCY WAS SLACKER

What Would You Call Willard and Fulton?

Readers will recall with what contempt Leslie D'Arcy, the Australian boxer, was lauded through the United States as a "slacker," says the Toronto Globe. During his ill-starred tour of the Republic, whether he had come from under the Southern Cross in search of a fortune with which he could endow the declining years of his aged mother, he was target for scornful epithets and cold-shouldered objections. Finally he went to a hospital, and with a peal on his lips that he had intended to join the army after he had secured one big American purse, he died. Then came the sub-squad that had previously condemned him, and told everyone, as is the trick of human nature after a man is beyond the stabs of the dagger-tongues, what a fine fellow D'Arcy was at heart. Everyone was sorry. Obituary notices should speak no ill.

Having the fate of D'Arcy in mind, it is not out of place to call attention to the negotiations which are under way for the Willard-Fulton bout. Here are two giants who have both gained fortunes in the prize ring. They could earn (?) enough money to live for the rest of their lives by a few months in vaudeville. But for months past they have been endeavoring to work up interest in a heavyweight battle, and finally they have signed articles. So far the location of the arena has not yet been decided. Several State Governors have forbidden the exhibition, but from other States offers have come. There has been no outcry over the bout in the American press. The two big bruisers, who might well take Canadian Jack Munroe as an example, have not been called slackers, as was D'Arcy.

Soldier Boxing Follows Canada.

Colonel Mayes, Director of the Canadian Army Gymnastic school in London, holds very strongly to the opinion that boxing should form a regular part of the soldier's training, and his views seem likely to actuate the Imperial authorities. At present only a small percentage of the English troops, in training have been put through a boxing course, but the army gymnastic staff has had its eyes opened by what the Canadian training camps have accomplished.

During the coming summer boxing will form a regular and important part of the training throughout English camps. The most noticeable feature of the boxing practice will be that every budding soldier will be taught to take "punishment" as well as to give it. Undoubtedly the boxing bouts will become the most popular portion of camp routine.

Durnan May Coach Cubans.

Eddie Durnan, of Toronto, professional single sculling champion of America, leaves at the first of the week for New York, where he will meet Coach "Jimmy" Rice, formerly of Toronto, now coach of the Columbia University crews, and a representative of a rowing club at Havana, Cuba, relative to accepting a position as coach in the Cuban capital for the summer months.

The high water mark was reached when 105 men volunteered, seventy for the United States Navy and thirty-five for the British and Canadian forces, as a result of his relentless logic and sledgehammer emphasis on duty and loyalty to country. Joe Taylor is an invaluable oratorical asset to the cause for which he speaks so forcefully and effectively. He has the reputation of having fired more civilians with the fever to enlist than any other man living, and he has lived up to his reputation as from touring cars and the British tank he has hurled thunderbolts of wrath at the Kaiser and kindled the fires of patriotism in uncounted hearts.
