## MEETING OF ORANGEMEN INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

### PASSES RESOLUTIONS WITH REGARD TO CIVIC MATTERS.

Want City Council to Control Utilities and Fuel Controller to be One of the Present City Officials.

At a mass meeting of the Orange Lodge of the city held Tuesday evening a number of important matters were considered and the attention of Grand Lodge directed to them. There was a very large attendance of the brethren from the city and a number from the County of Frontenac.

Much discussion was provoked by a reference to the city auditor's report and the report of the chairman of the Public Utilities Commission. The practice of the Commission in conducting some of its business behind closed doors was condemned. The following resolution was passed by unanimous vote:

"Resolved, that in the opinion of this mass meeting of the Orange Association in Kingston the Public Utilities should be in the management and control of the City Council. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the City Council and to the city press."

The position of fuel controller for the city was also discussed. It was felt that a great mistake would be made to appoint a business man as his business connections would render him liable to outside influences, which would not be the case if one of the present permanent city officials were made fuel controller. It was recognized that the fuel controller became in fact a city official the moment he was appointed, but as the position was only temporary and the remuneration small—too small, in fact, to justify a man in giving his entire time to the work—it would be better to add the work to the office of one of the present officials. This view seemed to be generally held and the following resolution was passed by unanimous vote:

"Resolved, that in the opinion of this mass meeting of the City Council should appoint to the position of fuel controller an official of the city. That a copy of this resolution be sent by the secretary to the City Council and to the city press."

**Poultry Association Meeting.**  
The regular meeting of the Poultry Association will be held on Thursday evening in the Sons of England hall, when the following members will give short talks on their respective breeds of birds, comprising several of the light weight varieties: J. McGregor, blue Andalusians; H. Walsh, rose comb white Leghorns; R. Marchand, brown Leghorns; J. Maguire, buff Leghorns; J. White, Black Hamburgs.

These enquiry and information meetings are being held for the sole purpose of helping on the Greater Production movement and anyone who intends or has any desire of keeping chickens, this is a golden opportunity for them to learn a few things about the different breeds so as to help them in deciding what kinds of birds they will keep to supply the demand for eggs and meat next winter.

**Carrying On Creditably.**  
The recent decision of the central appeal judge, Justice Duff, waiving the exemption claims of bank clerks as insufficient ground for not reporting for service, has already had its effect on the banks. A large number of the clerks who have been affected by the ruling have either voluntarily enlisted in some branch of the service or have been called to serve in the infantry battalions.

**Air Raid on New York.**  
The Hague, April 24.—The Vossische Zeitung alleges that it hears indirectly from Paris that the whole American coast is patrolled by waterplanes.

The paper says that Major Haver's declares that an air raid on New York is not only possible, but probable, and that special submarines are being built in Germany to carry airplanes which can be dismantled. Each airplane would then drop 100 kilos of explosives on the roof of New York and would even penetrate 450 kilometres inland.

By special request, the play, "Seven Wishes," was repeated in St. James' school room on Tuesday night. It was witnessed by a fairly large audience, and much enjoyed. This play was given a week or so ago, and made such a hit that the request came for it to be given again. The proceeds of the Tuesday night go to the Red Cross Society, and the sum of \$20 was realized.
