FOR THE TERRIBLE CASUALTIES THE GERMANS SUSTAINED.

The Enemy Army Leader's Reputation is Beginning to Suffer-Every German Assault That Fails Will

Injure Him. New York April 26 .- The assembling of the Reichstag this week has increased the urgency for a quick German victory, along the west front; and it is principally to forestall criticism by the members of the Reichstag that von Hindenburg is now trying to drive his semi-exhaust-

ed troops to a further advance. A firm stand by the allies at this time and the consequent abandonment by von Hindenburg of his new offensive will undoubtedly have a profound effect upon the Reichstag. There is no question but that a critical attitude toward the stupendous west slaughter of Germans has arisen in the Reichstag. The territorial gains are coming to be considered wholly inadequate compensation for the heavy casualties, by a growing section of German public opinion. Unless von Hindenburg, therefore, can conjure up a new victory of stupendous proportions, he must submit to increasing criticism at home that will seriously threaten his prestige.
